It is ordered by the governing body of the town of Shelly that water works honds of said town of Shelby, a municipality of the county of Clevpland, state of North Carolina, be avthorized and issued:

(a) For the purpose of enlarging and extending the water works system of said town of Shelby. (h) The mavimum accreeate prin.
