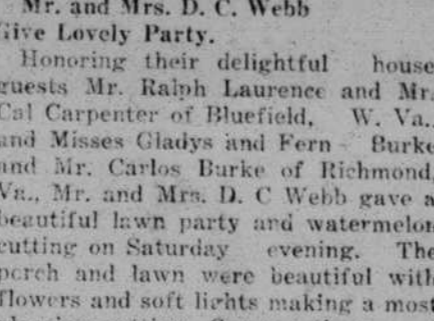
Mr. Grover Hamrick Delightful Host.
