### "Looker On" Writes of White House and Inaugural Balls.

Now that the White house has been renovated and "all done over" and the famous East room which 23 years ago had hardwood floors put in, but now the carpet which was discarded then, has been taken out and the room re-carpeted and the furniture Colonial, all this takes one back to history when the first inaugural ball was held in Washington and Dolly Madison was the central figure. It was on March 4th 1809 James Madison took oath of office for his second term and according to chroniclers of the day, it was a brilliant assemblage, attended by almost 400 people. This opening function was given in Long's hotel and the Washington dancing assemblage had appointed a committee of its most capable members to act as managers on this august occasion. In those days tickets for the ball were sold over the bar, and for five dollars a gallant could escort two ladies, but the coveted card could not be his without the signature of a manager. Dancing began at seven sharp and stopped at 12 for the excellent reason that on the stroke the music ceased and the hotel attendants began to extinguish the wax candles. One may readily visualize the winsome Dolly and her shy "Jimmie" moving among the throng of cavaliers, all in small clothes and wigs, and the ladies in powder and patches and gowns of tremendous girth. As a city Washington was a crude young thing, just in its tenth year and with scant provision for such a fête. The last inaugural ball was a century later on March 4th 1909, when William Howard Taft and James Schoolcraft Sherman wrote their names into the National records. This was a climax in these supreme events in the municipal history of Washington, distinct from its national aspect. Between these dates were balls which rose in splendor from the rather sorry attempt of Mistress Dolly's to the grand levee which marked Grant's second inauguration, when the weather was so cold that the ball began with the passing of steaming hot drinks to the guests as they entered in order to hearten them into a semblance of gaiety. Cleveland's second inauguration held as its climax a beautiful ball, held in the newly completed National museum.
