NEXT ESTIMATE ON COTTON MAY BE UP

All Estimates are around Fifteen Million Bales. Exports Ahead of That of Last Year.

(By R. J. McCarley's special wire from New York, New Orleans and Chicago.)

New Orleans, La., Nov. 5.—Market ruled erratic today, opening a shade higher owing to better cables than due, values then eased in consequence of private large crop estimates, thereafter advancing sharply as result of continuance of unfavorable weather in the interior, especially in the Mississippi valley states, where the rainfall was excessive, and because of claims that considerable damage was done to late cotton by the recent freeze in Oklahoma and northwest Texas.

Returns to the Fossick bureau, Memphis, Tenn., indicate that 11,150,000 bales were ginned to November 1st, against 9,716,000 to same date last year, and point to a crop of 15,100,000 bales against their previous estimate of 15,044,000 bales when the government report was 15,225,000 bales.

Returns to a prominent New York firm indicate 11,214,000 bales ginned to November 1st, and point to a yield of 14,941,000 bales. As yet the rains continue in Mississippi valley states, and much damage, especially to the grade, is reported, but there are prospects for a better weather in near future to come from a cold wave now approaching the cotton region.

By reason of lowering of grade of crop further by the additional rains, the basis in the interior was reported generally higher today, especially in central portion of the belt, where the rainfall was excessive to torrential at numerous points, in low lands.

Compared with last season, exports from the United States this far total 434,000 bales this week against 303,000 making the total since August 1st 2,150,000.

Weekly statistics as to the weeks in sight and spinners takings tomorrow are likely to be bullish, especially as to mill takings, perhaps as regards the weeks in sight as well. Returns will run against and in sight for the week of 723,000 last year was 736,000 last week, and spinners takings for week compare with 423,000 last year, were 443,000 last week.

Meanwhile the trade will have to reckon with next Monday's cotton crop forecast. Some people believe that it will be as large or larger than the previous estimate. While not a few are of opinion that it will be smaller than its recent forecast for 15,225,000, perhaps less than 15,000,000 bales. H. AND B. BEER.

STATE TAXES SHOW

(Continued from page one.) took 2,925. The North Carolina Orphan Association has appealed for the annual Thanksgiving offering for orphans of the State. All are asked to contribute.

Governor McLean has appointed on the board of managers of the State Home and Industrial School for Girls and Women at Samarcan Mrs. W. N. Everett, Raleigh; Dr. A. McCahey, Charlotte; Leonard Tufts, Pinehurst. On the board, of directors of the State Hospital for the insane, Morganton, C. E. Brooks, Hendersonville; J. H. Giles, Glen Alpine; Dr. C. S. Kirby, Marion, and S. M. Robinson, Gastonia.

The Corporation Commission has been requested to allow the Western Union Telegraph Company to revise its rates in North Carolina so as to make them conform with rates in other states served by that corporation. It is proposed to abolish the flat rate and base charges for messages on the distance between points.

"Calculators" figure that the revision proposed would increase tolls in the State something like thirteen per cent. The Postal Telegraph Company is not a party to the request. It is still operating on a flat rate five cents lower per ten words than the Western Union.

The "turnip web worm," according

to Dr. R. W. Leiby, entomologist of the State Department of Agriculture "can be readily controlled by spraying or dusting with a poison such as arsenate of lead," a quarter of a pound to twelve gallons of water. In dusting with a mixture Doctor Leiby advises one part dry lead arsenate to six parts of air-slacked or finishing lime.

"Morehead to Murphy" may soon be the slogan of half a dozen bus lines now operating within the State. R. O. Self, State Director, figures that the trip would require about twenty-five hours actual traveling and five changes, viz: Goldsboro, Raleigh, Charlotte, Asheville and Waynesville. The distance is a little more than 600 miles.

The Division of Markets, State Department of Agriculture, calls attention to the demand for cucumbers, cabbage, tomatoes and other vegetables for pickling purposes. The pickle industry has become quite important in the western section of the State and outside capital is being attracted there as well as to the counties of Wayne, Pender, New Hanover, Duplin and Sampson in the East.

It is announced that appeal of W. B. Cooper, former lieutenant governor of North Carolina, will be heard by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals at Richmond on November 9th. Mr. Cooper was sentenced to serve eighteen months in the Federal prison at Atlanta following his conviction of violating the national banking laws while an officer of the defunct Commercial National Bank of Wilmington two or three years ago.

Northern interests are said to be negotiating options on the principal bus lines operating in this State and we may soon be in the clutches of a combination instead of being served by private lines. With state supervision it makes little difference as to ownership.
