Meat Curing Recipe Given

(Extension Service.)

The first prize ham at the Cleveland county fair was sugar cured by the government recipe and exhibited by D. F. Beam of Lawndale.

Meat that is cured by the government recipe is much sweeter flavored, is tender, and retains the color of fresh pork, and does not dry out as much as the salt cured hams says Mr. Beam. Shoulders cured by the government recipe are better than hams cured by the salt method like many farmers use.

Mr. Beam used the following recipe: 8 pounds of salt; 2 oz. salt petre; 2 1-2 pounds brown sugar; 3 oz. black pepper; 2 oz. red pepper.

Rub this mixture in thoroughly on fresh killed meat and let lay on salting board for three weeks, then wrap closely with heavy wrapping paper and put in thick sack tying tightly and hang up in smokehouse.

Get this out and try it. If you don't think meat is better cured by this recipe ask Tom Stansley of Fallston, Heyward Hill of Shelby or Harry Falls of Kings Mountain about it.

of the success of Mr. McSwain in the lumber business.

Realizing the possibilities of marketing their products and applying an evident demand, E. S. McSwain accompanied by one of his assistants, W. H. Dean have just returned from an extensive motor trip through Florida, investing first hand the need for lumber in that section, with a determination to relieve that condition.

Facing impossibilities of doing so on account of continued embargoes on railroads, he has chartered and placed into the service a steamer to carry lumber to Miami and other distressed sections of Florida, where it will be distributed thru their own yards. By this means they will be of material assistance in relieving the distressed conditions caused by housing shortages and enable contractors to resume work on hotels, apartments residences, as well as office buildings which have been stopped for lack of material.

First sailing of this vessel will be made during next week, with a cargo of lumber valued at about \$75,000.00 the largest ever assembled by any Montgomery Wholesale firm—which will be followed by regular trips at the rate of about two per month, since the boat has been chartered to run in this service for the McSwain Lumber Company regularly.

Baptist Church Gets Large Sum From Will of Late B. F. Huntley

Winston-Salem, Nov. 2.—The will of B. F. Huntley was filed for probate this afternoon, disposing of his entire estate, the value of which has not been estimated, though it is known to be more than a million dollars.

The bulk of the estate is left to Mrs. Huntley and children. In addition bequests are made, to immediate relatives of stocks in the B. F. Huntley Furniture company, this to be held in trust by the Wachovia Bank and Trust company, the income therefrom to be paid to the beneficiaries during their life. The will further provides that upon their death the principal and income shall be vested in religious and educational institutions as follows:

Four thousand shares class B common stock of the B. F. Huntley Furniture company to the trustees of the First Baptist church, to be used in the promotion of the work of the Sunday school.

Four thousand shares to the trustees of the First Baptist church to be used in their discretion for the advancement of the church in carrying on its spiritual and evangelistic work.

Four thousand shares, one-half to the state mission board of the Baptist state convention, and one-half to the foreign mission board of the southern Baptist convention for the promotion of their work.

Twenty-five hundred shares to be divided, 1,000 to the Meredith college at Raleigh, and 1,500 shares to the Baptist Foundation, Inc.
