Big Fire At Waco.

"Last Saturday morning at about 2 o'clock the large dry goods and grocery store of Beam & Hoyle at Waco was completely destroyed by fire. Soon after the fire was first discovered the walls and roof of the building fell in. Very little was saved."

"The loss is very heavy. A few weeks ago when they took stock they had \$7,000 worth of goods. Their new stock for the fall and winter trade had just arrived and been packed in the store, making in all about \$10,000 worth of goods, with no insurance whatever."

"The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to be the work of an incendiary, and there appears to be sufficient ground for the supposition. It is the prevailing opinion that the store was robbed and then set on fire by the thieving scoundrels to cover up the robbery. A box of cheese was found in the door and the cheese knife was laying on the ground a few feet away."

"The dwelling house of Mr. D. Hoyle Elliott caught fire but the flames

were extinguished before any damage was done."
