est V. Webb, of Kinston, and Maj. W. A. Erwin, succeeds W. J. Brogden, now Associate Justice of the Supreme court, as trustee of the North Carolina College for Negroes located at Durham. Senator Holderness goes to Richmond to become vice-president of the Virginia Carolina Chemical Company. His successor on the salary and Wage Commission is said to be especially qualified for the duties of the position to which he has been called by the Governor while Major Erwin never lets anything drag, with which he is connected.

Survey for Tunnel

In the opinion of Chairman Frank Page of the State Highway Commission, a circular tunnel under the Cape Fear River at Wilmington would be preferable to a bridge across the river at the point desired by the city authorities. The General authorized a bond issue of \$1,000,000 which is half a million short of the estimated cost of a bridge. Cost of the tunnel is placed at one million. The Commissioner has ordered a complete survey of both propositions with the view to reaching a course which may prove the wiser. Engineers differ as to the cost of putting up the steel spans for a bridge and also as to whether the foundation will be of sufficient strength to bear the weight of the huge supporters that will be necessary to make the structure "safe and secure."

From Tuesday until Saturday the home demonstration agents of the State Agricultural Experiment Service have been in action at the State College of Agriculture and Engineering laying plans for the year work. Farm life in all its phases was discussed by speakers of note from far and near. The meeting is conceded, by Prof. I. O. Schaub, dean of school of agriculture, to have been the most helpful and most important of any similar gathering at the College in a long period of years.

Studying Our Schools.

An interested visitor to the State recently was Miss Willie Lawson deputy state superintendent of school work in Arkansas, who came here to make a study of the North Carolina system of education. During her brief sojourn in Raleigh Miss Lawson devoted most of her time to the investigation of reports touching the educational progress of the State and the methods employed in the operation of State and private schools. She expressed the opinion that North Carolina knows how to do some things better than any other state and was interested to find that one-teacher schools are gradually becoming extinct in this part of the country, there being at present

only 2,731 in this State.

State Owned Radio. The suggestion of Governor McLean concerning a State owned radio plant has received the endorsement of the Raleigh Symphony Orchestra and the appointment of a committee to confer with His Excellency relative to developments of the plan; the Governor tells a New York investment concern that the State does not care to dispose of its railroad stock; the Chief Executive wires senator Simmons to secure postponement of hearing on the water power bill so those interested may be heard; State Bar Association Committee tentatively selects Wrightsville Beach for meeting place next June; Annual meeting of State Fair Association at Sir Walter Hotel here January 21st eleven o'clock in the morning.

By appointment of Governor McLean, Don Elias of Asheville, son of the late Kope Elias, becomes a trustee of the Cullowhee State Normal School in Jackson county, succeeding James G. K. McClure, Jr., of the same city, resigned, and who has accepted appointment as a member of the board of directors of the State Department of Conservation and Development.

R. W. Walker indicted in the Wake Superior court for employing a negro at his saw mill in violation of the State child labor law, was acquitted by the jury after setting up the claim that W. N. Walker did the recruiting of labor for his mill and should be held responsible for the offense which resulted in the loss of both hands to the juvenile colored boy. The latter Mr. Walker has not been apprehended.

The State Board of Charities and Public Welfare announces that an institute for workers in negro welfare is to be held at the Winston-Salem teachers college January 13 to 15, inclusive.

The Theft Bureau of the Automobile License Department reports the recovery of 71 motor vehicles during the month of December most of them being Ford cars.

Bad Beetle

A Rhinoceros beetle several inches in length, said to be a very destructive insect and peculiar to South America, fell into the hands of Claude Woodall clerk in the Raleigh postoffice a few days ago and now "reclines" in a bottle in the office of Dr. R. W. Leiby at State College. The insect carries a multi-colored shell and is supposed to have come in a mail bag from Chili.

It is announced that John H. Bonitz who has been with the school house planning bureau of the State Department of Education for two or three years resigns to become associated with the Aetna Bonding Company as building inspector on the

first of February.

Improving Old Meredith. Plans for extensive improvements in the old main building of Meredith College and the ground surrounding it are being developed with the view to opening a resort hotel there early in the spring. The property was acquired by the Capital Hotel Corporation at public auction last summer and \$550,000 in improvements is being expended in supplying modern conveniences in building and in making the surroundings more attractive. The United States Army is receiving many recruits from North Carolina these days, more than 100 having enlisted here during recent months. May be preparing for war in these times of peace. Who knows? During New Year's week the traffic fatalities for North Carolina were reported to be fourteen, the largest

number recorded for any other southern state. Good roads appear to be a great incentive to speeding and too many folks just will not be careful. In his answer to the complaint of Rev. A. L. Ormond W. B. Cole, affirms that he is not responsible for the death of the former's son, W. W. Ormond in Rockingham last August. The case will come up for trial later this year.

Certain Acquittal. The village loafer had been arraigned on a charge of chicken stealing, and had informed his attorney that he intended to plead guilty.
