Extension Course Continues Program

Dr. B. A. Stevens on Thursday January 23, completed the courses in Education given in extension by the University of North Carolina. These two courses are equivalent in credit to one-half a summer school. On this same day he will organize classes for a continuation in these same courses.
New registration will be permitted and all teachers who are planning to do extension work this spring are urged to be at the central school building on Thursday afternoon January 28 at 3:30. The courses offered during the spring term will be classroom management and methods in teaching. These two courses will continue for a period of 16 meetings and will be equivalent in credit to one-half summer school. Assurance is given that the courses will be completed by the first week in May. Tuition fees for these courses are nominal.

WIDE BUS TO QUIT ROADS OF STATE

The bus ruling that requires cutting down the width of the busses goes into effect February 22 and operators of lines in and out of this city are preparing to have their cars in shape for the decree, which was made by the state corporation commission.
Several of the lines have busses that are over the legal width. It was complaint against such wide cars on the highways, by other motorists that led to the ruling that the width of the cars must be cut down. The bus companies were given until February 22 to get them to the proper size.

That means the wide cars will have to be taken off the road or be worked out, which would appear to be rather difficult operation. However, it was learned yesterday that some of the operators do intend to take their cars to shop and make them narrower.
It was claimed by some of the bus men when there was agitation against the wide busses, that they looked bigger than they were; that a person in a small car seeing one of them coming thought he might be wiped off the road, but that the big busses and other cars could pass all right without either getting off the road. Still, it was decreed that they were too wide and made too close passing.

These big, wide cars were put on at a time when the bus business seemed rosy, full of profits while the operators were feeling good over the prospect and even had thoughts of putting on pullman busses. At an organization meeting of bus owners in this city about two years ago, when some sort of co-operation and amity was achieved, a man who had talked to the meeting and been instrumental in having the organization formed declared that "the state will now see deluxe transportation by bus, the finest in things were expected and the wide busses appeared, cars with an aisle between the seats just like a street car railway coach."

HISTORY OF JAZZ WRITERS
(Charlotte News.)
Add to the current types of jazz-man, that of history.
Rupert Hughes has discovered in his historical researches that George Washington was a firstclass boozier and roustabout, that the Father of his Country stayed up late 'o night, ambled about in gay fashion, wore a nose as red as a flaming meteor, could cuss like a sailor and was a general ne'er-do-well.
Then comes another historian to the stage with an anthem against our traditional heroes of the past, namely, some of those of the Confederacy.
Frank Lawrence Owsley, associate professor of history in Vanderbilt University ascribes the defeat of the Confederate forces to "gross incompetency and lack of National spirit," and asserts that the cause collapsed because of the distrust of Southern Governors of one another and their fear that they were not doing, individually, their part to hold up their end of the load.
He castigates Governor Brown of Georgia and Governor Vance of North Carolina who were officiating in their respective States at the time declaring that Governor Vance had 92,000 uniforms in ware houses at the close of the war and vast quantities of blankets when Lee's soldiers were in rags and bare feet.
Charity and Children resents this fling as every other patriotic citizen and agency in North Carolina will rebel against any such diatribes against the great Vance, the Thomsville organ remarking aright that "if Vance had a weakness it was that his sympathy for his suffering people sometimes overblamed his judgement. There was no cruelty in his nature. He is considered the most provident was Governor of the Confederacy. Nothing that he could ever do was left undone for the comfort of the soldiers in the field.
