**A Day in New York With Shelby Native**

New York, today is quite different from what it was twenty five years ago. All the best and finest part of the city has been built during the last quarter of a century, since 1900.

Those who know, say the safest place to walk in New York at night is on Broadway—this we did until the Theatres turned out and the buses gathered up their crowds for Chinatown and the Slums of East Side. We started from where 42 nd, St. crosses Broadway one of the most congested centers in the world. While the East Side the Ghetto, The Bowery are still here today they are not the same, for they are saloon less now. All things change, many of the old characters, such as Chuck Connors, are gone. About fifty in our crowd hear a lecture in the old Chinese theatre, now a mission where a few years ago one night after a long war the police found about two dozen Chinese dead and wounded. Now we are entertained by "China Charlie" in the Chinese temple who shows us the difference between their religion and ours. All very instructive and entertaining.

**Seeing the City**

The next day the Doctor (Anders) and I used the Subway—Surface elevated, and observation buses to take in the city. Up River Side Drive with Hudson River on our left in observation bus we pass the late James B. Dukes' home 75th street, whose executives were meeting there that day—we stop at Grants temporary Tomb on a high bluff overlooking the Hudson, then we turn back by Harlem Heights, where a Tablet says Washington defeated the British Sept. 12th, 1776. Here we enter the Columbia University Area an immense number of buildings five thousand professors, twenty thousand students emerging from the main office on to the terrace where they conferred degree on King Albert of Belgium. We pass by St. John's Cathedral it is now on its way to completion. Passing down morning-side Park we come into Fifth Avenue at the upper end of Central Park then down by the Metropolitan museum, it would take several weeks to go through this alone we reach Battery Park by the elevated Road. Here we take a look at the Statue of Liberty guarding the entrance to the harbor, and just over a little way we see Ellis Island where all the emigrants land. From here again, back to the Woolworth building. "The Cathedral of Commerce," of all the buildings it is Queen. I could tell you how deep are its foundations, how concrete steel, marble and copper went into the building, but that is not what we want—we wish to take a look from the 58th floor where the unaided eyes can see the homes, workshops, and play grounds of six million people representing every nationality under the sun. And only one half of them Americans. As they go about their daily tasks, the noise of the traffic comes to us here 790 feet above the street, as the noise of the ocean breaking upon a far off rocky shore.

**Politically.**

New York, besides being the largest city has lately become the financial center of the world and I think if they will make good American citizens of their foreigners stop so much bootlegging among them and then quit trying to run the rest of our country politically we will all get along better. Mayor Walker says he is going to make it the most decent city of all—we see no reason why he should not. We believe he is making a good start in that direction from what we see in the papers. Shortly after his election he visited Atlanta, and is scheduled to visit several cities of the South west this Spring, including Texas. We hope he may leave what kind of men the South wants for presidential candidates, and that they will let Gov. Al Smith retire from politics as he wishes to do. With Bryan out, Tammany may lead if they pick men that the South will support.

**The Bigness of it (Charlotte News)**

America has come to be so big that it is difficult to get its immensities down to a level where the ordinary mind can comprehend its vastness. Somebody has tried to bring it down to this understandable bases by putting it this way.

We have over 40 per cent of all the installed waterpower in the world. We produce nearly 41 out of every 100 bushels of the world's cereals; 71 per cent of the world's cotton; 50 per cent of its coal; 61 per cent of its petroleum; 52 per cent of its timber; and we own 35 per cent of its railroads mileage.

Or, put it another way: Every hour of every 24 hour day we earn \$8,000,000—we consume \$7,000,000—and we save (that is, do not immediately use up) \$1,000,000. Now multiply these figures by 24 and then by 365—and you get some notion of Uncle Sam's "size" in money.

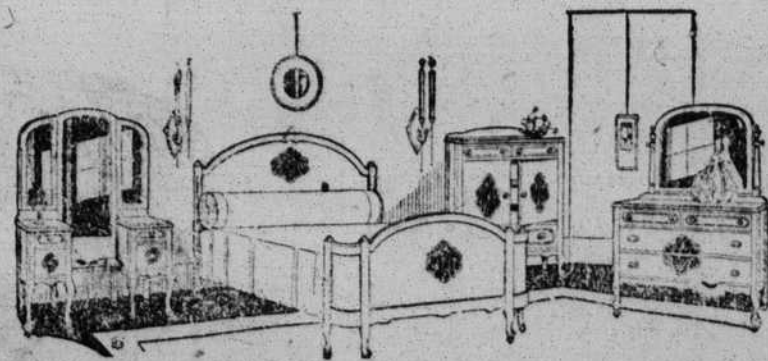
