FIRED FIRST SHOT IN WAR BETWEEN STATES

Asheville.—The cloak of years that bent the shoulders of a handful of Confederate veterans who had assembled to commemorate the birthday of General Robert E. Lee, dropped for a magic moment when T. Y. Lyda, company E, Buncombe county rifleman, recounted the story of how he fired the first gun of the war between the states on June 8, 1861, in

a preliminary of skirmish before the battle of Bethel Church. A detail of ten men had been sent ahead, he said, to break up skirmishing expeditions of Federal troops stationed at Newport News. Paris Girls Bank On Form And Want Lengthen Skirts

Nothing So Graceful As Pretty Leg. Reason Given, Shapeliness Declares Length.

Paris.—American women and girls may wear their skirts longer but we will not, is the abrupt reply of the French to information from New York that evening dresses are being worn down to the ankle and other clothes will follow suit.

Wearers of skirts in Paris are unanimous in favor of keeping them short and are supported by the designers, but the latter are somewhat prejudiced by the indication that America would try to dictate women's fashions.

"This is another attempt," said the manager of a well known Rue de la Paix establishment, "to wrest the position of arbiter of what women ought to wear from Paris, but it will

fail like the others which preceded it. Even now American buyers are on liners en route to Paris. They will arrive in a day or two to see our models, and then there will be a race back to New York to see who will get there first; and I assure you the first to arrive will be showing models of skirts as short, if not shorter than ever."

M. Clement, manager of Paquin's says their robes are no longer, but that there is talk of shortening them further. The reason is evident, he adds, for there is nothing so graceful as a pretty leg.

A spokesman for Jenny's in the Champs Elysees, the trend is toward shorter dresses for evening as well as ordinary wear. Another designer said that when American shortened its dresses too far, Paris resisted, and it will be the same now.

"We do not dress women en masses," he said, "but singly, and we advise a shorter or longer robe according to the woman's figure especially the shapeliness of her legs."

The only dissenting note came from Paul Poiret, who said dresses are too short, and that if an eighth of an inch more is cut off they will be hopelessly exaggerated.

Several midnettes who wear short skirts and also help make them, came right out for the abbreviated mode, one declaring, if "American girls had as beautiful legs as we have, they would not want to hide them." Several however, hoped the skirts would get no shorter admitting they are

Such persons are impressionable and will find great difficulty in properly interpreting the text of such books. They will often have suggested to them new symptoms which will create new fears, and perhaps because of differences of opinions of various authors be led into confusion.

It is far preferable to present one's symptoms to a properly trained physician who can interpret an individual case and give advice suitable to the patient and his environment. Although the material in some books on these subjects may be wise and logical it cannot be applied to individual cases. Attempts to find solace from such publications frequently lead to increased disability.
