EXPERTS TO MAKE TEST OF SPINNING CAROLINA SHORT STAPLE COTTON

Washington, Feb. 25.—Agricultural experts will be sent to Columbia, S. C., to make cotton spinning tests of the short staple cotton grown in the state with the view of improving the quality.
At the request of Senator Smith,

Democrat, South Carolina, the department of agriculture has agreed to send a representative to Columbia and the department's collaborators at Clemson college will make a study of cotton now grown and submit recommendations for producing a better grade. The senator acted on the request of the general manager of the South Carolina Cotton Growers Co-operative association.

Famous Rebel Exiled Comes Home to Die

New Orleans.—A little group of Confederate veterans, aged and feeble, is making preparations here to welcome back its former Major Edward A. Burke, 85, home gallant Confederate officer, and later State Treasurer of Louisiana, who will soon end a 35-year exile in Honduras, and come back to New Orleans.
Major Burke indicted in 1889 on 19 counts of misuse of state funds, involving \$200,000, fled to Honduras to escape prosecution. He had served with distinction as a Confederate officer and later in the bitter intervene warfare by which the whites drove out "carpet baggers" and negro officials in Louisiana during the reconstruction period. Prior to his indictment, Major Burke had been a social and political leader in New Orleans and other Southern cities.
During his long stay in the Central American Republic, the major rose to a position of high influence with the Honduran government. He became director of the National Railway, and operated the principal hotel in the Republic. He participated in half a dozen revolutions, and managed always to remain in favor with the faction in control of the government.
The dismissal of the indictments against him recently followed a conference by Governor Fuqua, and the attorney general of Louisiana. Governor Fuqua declaring that the major had "suffered enough," suggested that the indictments be dropped so that the aged veteran "might come home to die."
Major Burke, although he is 85 is said to be still in robust health, and is described by tourists as a striking figure, well known throughout the American tropics for his bravery and courtly dignity. He is said to wear white linen clothing and a huge Panama hat, and to number among his close personal friends high government officials, soldiers of fortune and other outstanding figures of Central America.

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
