Humphries Estate Valued at \$132,390 (Gaffney Ledger) The will of Preyor Humphries, filed in the office of Probate Judge Lake W. Stroup, leaves his entire estate consisting of 3,300 acres of land in Cherokee and Cleveland counties appraised at \$132,390, and personal property aggregating near \$13,000, to his widow, Mrs. Cynthia L. Humphries, for her life-time. Upon the death of Mrs. Humphries, the executors are directed to pay V. A. Humphries one of the sons, the sum of \$1,000 after which the remainder of the estate is to be equally divided among nine other children, with the children of a deceased son receiving their father's share. The will explains that V. A. Humphries now has an estate of his own that will be worth more than the shares of the other children after the division.

Blacksburg School Building Dedicated Grand Lodge of Masons of South Carolina Have Charge of the Exercises at Building.

The cornerstone of the new \$100,000 high school building was laid at Blacksburg Tuesday with impressive ceremonies, conducted by the Masonic grand lodge. Grand Master Charles Christenburgh, of Rock Hill, was prevented from coming and Deputy Grand Master John W. Williams, of York, presided placing under the massive stone a metal box containing copies of the Blacksburg News, Cherokee Times and Charlotte Observer, a roster of the local lodge members, memorial coins and historic documents. The building when complete will be one of the best in the state, one of which Blacksburg and Cherokee county may be justly proud. It will serve high school pupils in six districts, all of Cherokee county east of Broad River. B. L.
