Girl Who Left Home Here Located by Father in South Carolina Town Friday.

The following dispatch appearing in the Gaffney, S. C. Ledger Saturday will be of interest in Shelby:
A young woman from Shelby, who arrived here yesterday morning on Southern train No. 15 at 9:30 o'clock was located by city and county officers and turned over to her father by noon.

Learning that his daughter, who is 19 years old, had left home and having certain information that led him to believe she had come to Gaffney, the father lost no time in covering the 20 miles between Gaffney and Shelby by automobile.

When he arrived and requested the help of the officers, the latter secured information from a taxi driver that a girl answering the description furnished by the father had disembarked from No. 15 and gone to Musgrove Mills.
Accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Joe Watkins, the Shelbyite went to Musgrove where the young woman was found in a store. Officers here made no record of the affair, and stated they did not remember the names of the persons involved.
