More Coin In Brains For Colleges Of U. S.

Ithaca, N. Y., June 17.- American olleges put too much money into buildings and not enough into brains is the opinion of Dr. Ernest Cohen, eminent Dutch chemist who is lecturing at Cornell prior to visiting other American universities.

Dr. Cohen, who is professor physical chemistry at the university of Utrecht, and president of the International congress of pure and applied chemistry, believes that although higher education in America is rapidly approaching European standards, the importance of physical equipment is over-emphasized here.
