Punishment for Perjury "Fall term Iredell Superior Court November 6 1918: State vs. Jonathan Coffey: Perjury: Plea Not guilty of the perjury in the manner and form as charged in the bill of indictment

"The prisoner Johnathan Coffey, being placed at the bar and demanded if he had anything to say why the sentence of the law should not pronounced against him, said nothing; It is therefore adjudged by the Court that the prisoner at the bar, Jonathan Coffey, shall stand in the pillory for one hour at the expiration of which time both his ears shall be cut off and entirely severed from his head and that the ears so be cut off shall be nailed to the pillory and there remain until the setting of the sun, and that the said Jonathan Coffey be ever hereafter incapable of giving testimony in any courts of this state, or in any case whatever, until the revisal of this judgment, and that the said defendant stand committed till the payment of a fine of ten dollars and all costs of the prosecution. It is further ordered that this sentence be carried into execution by the sheriff of Iredell coun-

ty on Friday next two weeks.

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
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
