



Chimney Rock, Aug. 14 .- Work on the great Lake Lure dam will have progressed far enough to close the gates and commence impounding the waters by Wednesday or Thursday of next week, according to Resident En-gineer P. L. Holland. The officials of Chimney Rock Mountains, Inc., however, state that on account of the incomplete paving of Route 20 through the development the closing of the gates may be delayed a few days.


