KINGS MOUNTAIN BATTLE FOUGHT ON S. C. SOIL

We proud that the blood of martyrs has drenched our own hillside but the eyes of the world look upon Kings Mountain battlefield as sacred grounds. More and more are people everywhere waking up to the fact that October 7, 1780, marks an epoch in the history of the world and that the battle of Kings Mountain is to be numbered among the decisive battles of the world.

Fought in South Carolina. The battle of Kings Mountain was fought just nine miles from the present town of Kings Mountain October 7, 1780, from three to four fifteen in the afternoon, 28 Whigs or Americans, fell in the conflict, and 300 Tories or British warriors, were killed.

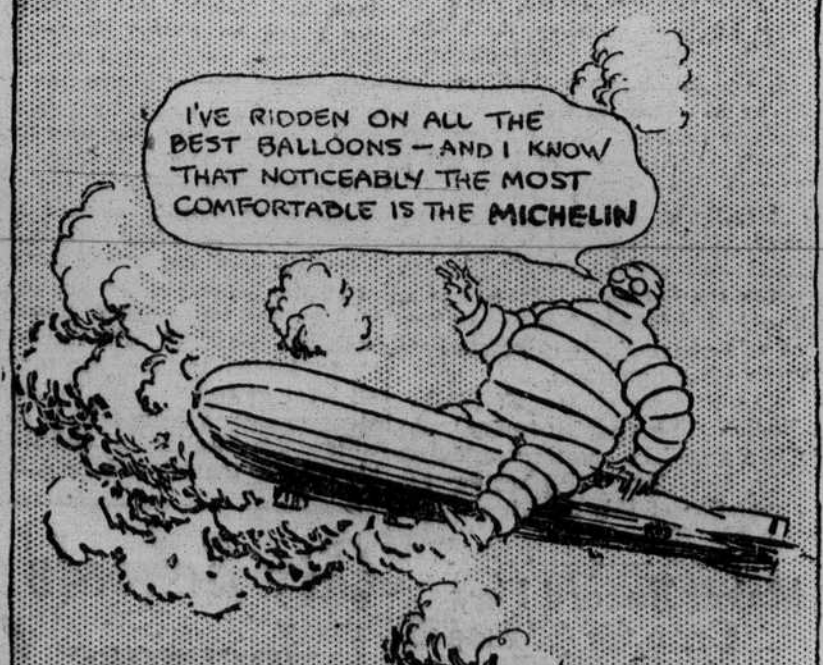
