The holidays and anniversaries are, Dickens' Birthday, February the seventh which has just passed, Lincoln's Birthday the 12th, tomorrow, St. Valentine's Day February the fourteenth Washington's Birthday the Twenty second, Lovell's birthday February the twenty-second, and Longfellow's birthday February the twenty-seventh. Other famous birthdays that come in February are Susan B. Anthony, Peter Cooner, Charles Darwin, Thomas Edison, David Garrick Horace Greeley, W. Henry Harrison, Victor Hugo, Joseph Jefferson, Charles Lamb, Sidney Lanier, John A. Logan, Mendelssohn Dwight L. Moody, Cardinal Newman Raphael, Elihu Root, and Jules Verne.

The flower of the month is the primrose "nursed in whirling storms and cradled in winds." The birthstone is the amethyst, signifying "with out wine." Five great events that happened in February were:—The Victoria Cross instituted 1856. Canada surrendered to England by treaty of Paris 1763. Spanish-American War closed, treaty in 1899. Washington Monument dedicated 1885. Napoleon's escape from Elba 1815. The historical calendar for February is singularly rich in events that challenge interest and memory.
