

ELLENBORO PLANT WILL MAKE SPREADS AT AN EARLY DATE

The Ellenboro Cotton Mill will start active work soon. The machinery has been ready some time but work could not start until the water was ready. The large tank is about ready. It has a capacity of 50,000 gallons. The small tank will be erected this week. It has a 10,000 gallon capacity. Twelve looms were ready Monday. The other eighteen will be installed soon.

All the employee's homes are filled. More houses will be erected soon. They are modern in every respect with electric lights, water, sewerage, etc.

The mill will be enlarged later. A slasher room and warehouse will be added. The mill will be ventilated and have ample lights, heat and amplifiers. Plan bed spreads will be manufactured at first. Later on they will be mercerized. Table cloths will be manufactured soon. The plant is equipped to make any kind of table cloth or bed spreads.

Mr. J. M. Lumley is superintendent of the mill; Mr. W. H. Belk, of Charlotte, is president while Mr. C. F. Harry of Grover will be general manager. Mr. Lumley was overseer of carding for the Henrietta Mills at Carolina for a number of years. Prospects are bright for good business for the mill.

The water tanks are supported with steel towers 100 feet high. One tank will be supplied with water from the artesian well which is about one hundred and thirty feet deep while the other tank will furnish water for the sprinkler system installed throughout the mill and for the fire plugs.

The water for one tank will be supplied from the creek which flows through the sixty-six acres of land owned by the company. The artesian well which supplies the larger tank will afford ample fresh water for the homes of all employees and drinking water for the mill.

A modern sewerage plant will be installed soon with a septic tank. The vacuum system of steam

heat for the mill will be used. The boiler house is to the rear of the main building. Nearby is the transformer station for the electric current.

The plant will mean much for Ellenboro and Rutherford county. It will furnish a nice payroll and bring many good families to the county.

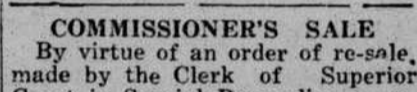
