Potatoes, beans and watermelons in the southeastern section of North Carolina were badly damaged by the late frosts.

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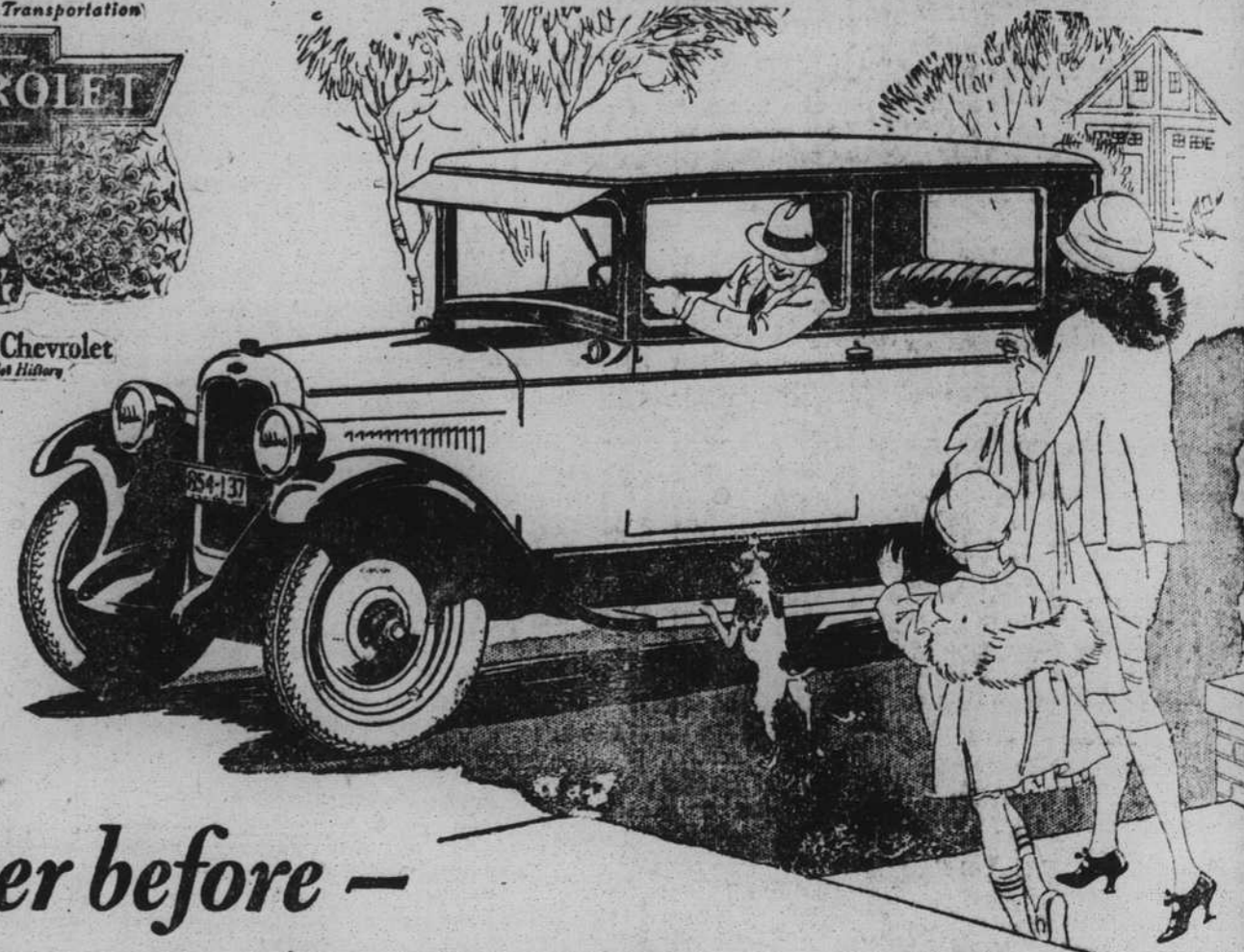
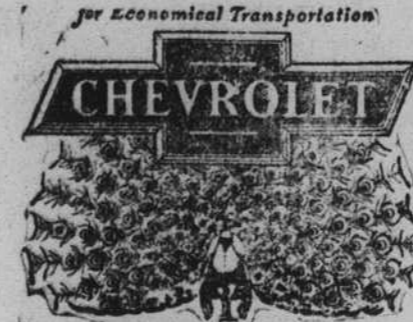
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
