LONDON POLICE COST IS \$40,000,000 EVERY YEAR

(By International News Service.) London.—It cost forty million dollars to run the London Metropolitan Police Force last year, according to figures issued. Chief items of expenditure were: Two-and-a-half million for pay of inspectors, sergeants, and patrolmen; eight million for pensions; and five million for clothing, housing and boot allowances.

The numerical strength of the force is returned at 19,869.
