

#### Prison "Death Row" Lonely Now With Only Three Occupants There

Raleigh, June 30 .- (INS)-State Prison's death row presented a lonely appearance today, with only three condemned men along the row of strong cells. There were four, but executive clemency whisked Joe Andres, Franklin county negro, from the jaws of death, and placed him in the State hospital for the insane (colored) at Goldsboro.

It now appears that there will be no execution at the prison for the remainder of the summer. The lone white man of Death's Row is W. L. Ross, alleged double slayer of Warren county, but he will get a new trial in September.

The other two inmates, negroes from Gaston county, have appeals before the State Supreme Court. Their execution will be stayed until the high tribunal acts on their cases. The Supreme Court is now having its summer recess, and the cases will not be reached until fall.

Ross, the white prisoner, was convicted nearly two years ago, for the murder of an aged Warren county couple, the benefactors of his little daughter. Aleinists are now examining the doomed man for traces of insanity. They are expected to make a report on his case in the near future.


