Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Pittsburg.—Failure of the motor industry to come through with a shower of orders in June, as had been anticipated, caused general disappointment among steel magnates in the Pittsburg district.

Two factors, a much weaker demand for automobiles than at the corresponding period last year and contemplated new models, are holding up the orders for steel, it was learned. But officials of the steel mills are confident that those orders will be forthcoming later in the summer.

Demands for strip steel was stimulated to a certain extent by orders just placed by one major concern which recently began to manufacture six-cylinder cars. The steel industry hopes this will be a forerunner of other large orders from different manufacturers in July, August and September.

On the whole production at the more important mills in this region is normal. Large independent plants are operating at 70 per cent capacity, and at the corporation mills the percentage is about 80.

Regardless of the attempt to limit production in the Seminole oil field the demand for pipe continues to be good, indicating no cessation of drilling operations. Prices remain unchanged.

Summer road-building is keeping the demand for reinforcing steel above that of all other types, leaders of the industry say. Plate orders are small.

Although Pennsylvania has more automatic "stop-and-go" traffic beacons than most states, the Pennsylvania Motor Federation, through Richard C. Haldeman, its president, expresses its preference for the ordinary traffic "cop."

Movement of traffic with a policeman on duty is infinitely more rapid than when a traffic beacon is the regulator, Haldeman finds. The federation urges all small towns, most of which now have one or more automatic signal lights to replace them with traffic "cops" on Sunday and holidays when traffic is heaviest.

The advantages to be gained through the substitution of officers on Sunday and holidays more than recompense a municipality for the additional expense, in the saving of time, Haldeman declared. Nor should the wear and tear on the minds and dispositions of motorists be overlooked.

There is no "back-to-the-farm" movement in Pennsylvania, the state department of agriculture announces, adding that in the last six years the number of farms that have been abandoned has doubled.

Latest records of the department show that 13,162 Pennsylvania farms are either idle or occupied by persons not engaged in farming. This means that 1,164,000 acres formerly under cultivation are unproductive now.

So serious has the situation become that the department of agriculture is endeavoring through census enumerators to get exact figures to determine the principal causes for farm abandonments.

Say Widow Kissed Deputy While Her Husband Lay Dead

Greenville, S. C.—Testimony that Henry Townsend kissed Mrs. Ethel Willis while the body of the latter's husband, Sheriff Sam D. Willis, was lying in the home, was given by the State today in the habeas corpus proceedings by which the widow and Townsend are seeking release on bond. They are charged with the murder of her husband. The statement was made in an affidavit by Mrs. Ellis Land, submitted by the State to Justice T. P. Cothran, who is presiding at the hearing.
