HAMAGES FOR HIS

Raleigh.-The Needleman mutilation case of 1925 returned to the public spot light this week when a copy of petition of Jospeh H. Needleman, Philadelphia, asking \$100,000 damages & for mutilation of his person by a masked mob was received at the office of United States Marshall Ward here.

The petition has just been filed in United States District Court at Washington. N. C., under jurisdiction of the Eastern Federal District of North Carolina.

Needleman is suing for \$75,000 compensatory damages and \$25,000 punitive damages against 22 persons of Martin County, three of Lcnoir and two of Wayne County. Prison punishment and fines were

meted out to 28 persons following trial for mutilation and conviction at the May special term Martin County in 1925.

The petition just filed calls for answer from those against whom warrants are being issued by the District Court clerk at Washington where the trial will be held. The answers are due within twenty

Needleman, two years ago was freed of attacking Ethel Griffin, of Martin. He was arrested March 26, 1925, in Edenton, N. C., taken from jail and his person mutilated.

Needleman brings suit as a pauner and brings it in federal court by reason of being a non resident of citizenship of the 28 defendants.

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
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
