Mauney and Revs. Beach and Cobb visited the stricken family Monday morning and say the conditions that existed at the home were almost indescribable and they soon came to the conclusion that the best plan was to take them to the hospital.

Drinking water from a germ-tainted well was attributed to the cause of the malady.

VETERAN TELLS OF BLOCKADE IN '61

Interesting Civil War Letter In Hands Of Shelby Man
J. N. Quinn

Mr. J. N. Quinn, N. Lafayette street is in possession of an interesting letter found in some old papers. The letter was written by his father Daniel Quinn to A. H. McFall and though it runs strain of heroism typical of the men in gray. The letter follows:
Head Quarters,
Evans Port, N. C.
Nov. 29, 1861.
Camp Hornor,
Price Williams, Co. Va.

My Dear Brother:
It is with pleasure this good morning that I avail myself of this present opportunity of writing you a few lines to inform you that I am well at this time, hoping these lines may safely come to your hands and find you all enjoying good health. I can say to you that I have nothing to write at this time. Our regiment has done a good deal of hard work since we have come to reorganize, though we have about got through with our work, though we have to drill about four hours a day. We have got our blockade completed so we don't let any vessels to or from Washington City.

When we opened our battery on the Yankees we took two sail vessels from them and their landing was said to be worth fifteen thousand dollars. One bombshell struck in about fifty yards of me was the nearest that any of them struck to where I was.

We have not had any musket fighting here yet and I don't think we will have, though if we do and I don't get killed I will write and give you the news soon as I can.

We have fixed here for winter quarters. The climate here is about like it is on the Blue Ridge though the wind does not blow so much as it does there. We have good water to drink and I expect that we shall stay here all my time out, until I start home.

A camp life is a disagreeable life to live, though I come here in the defense of the rites of my country, one that my wife and their children might enjoy their freedom what time they had to live in this world, and I am willing if it falls to my lot in the battle field in the rites of my country. I will only be gone a little while sooner than them that is left at home and it will be no disgrace to me for my friends to think it a just cause.

I received a letter from you the 26 of this month, bearing date the 12th, stating that you was all well which gives great satisfaction to hear that you was all well and doing well.

You stated in your letter that you had started some two or three letters to me and had got no answer which I was sorry to hear for I have written four letters to you before this.

If we was to be called into a fight here our forces is about 75

thousand strong. Our regiment is in very good health I think. Think it is very healthy here. I would like very much to see you all and talk with you at this time, though it is impossible at this time, though I hope in a few months it will be so I can be home with my family, so I can enjoy the company of my friends.

Our fare is much better than I thought it would be for we have plenty to eat such as corn bread, some bacon, sugar, coffee, rice, some molasses.

My paper is about to give out. I will write again soon. I will close by subscribing

San Francisco.—A state law to prohibit celebration of Fourth of July with fireworks is under consideration by Bay region legislators.

Although firecrackers are forbidden in most of the cities fringing San Francisco Bay, Chinese merchants "bootleg" the explosives to eager young celebrants, police officers complain.

Citizens living in cities where firecrackers cannot be sold buy their supplies from suburban merchants, it was asserted, and the only way this practice can be stopped is by state law.

Morganton, July 29.—Children playing with a loaded shot gun, one of them dead, is in brief the story of a tragedy occurring in a home near Morganton this afternoon. Mrs. Sidney Miller had left her three children on the porch at play while she went to water a cow. Hearing the report of a gun she hurried to the house to find that during her absence the oldest child,

a boy of eight, had taken the loaded gun from a closet and youngest, a little girl nearly lay on the porch in a dying condition. The child was rushed to Grady hospital here but died before reaching the hospital. The father is employe of the Burke tannery and was at his work at the time of the tragic occurrence.
