

Beautiful To Die Girl Says After 15 Minutes Death

Carteret, N. J.—"It is beautiful to die! Those are the words of a girl who, as far as medical science can determine, was actually dead for 15 minutes. She is Anna Scutto, 12, who was revived after all signs of life apparently disappeared by the injection of adrenalin into her heart. She had been playing Fort Reading creek, when she stepped into a 10-foot mud hole. "I felt my head going farther and farther into the mud," Anna

said wistfully. "I felt the breath leaving my body and I knew that I could not help myself. It was all very pretty. I remember seeing my mother, my little brothers, and everything was so soft and sweet. It was beautiful. I seemed to fall into a beautiful sleep." Anna, who is almost fully recovered from her harrowing experience, said she would never again go paddling into the waters of the creek. She owes her life to Michael Faterosi, her uncle, who pulled her from the mud, and Dr. Samuel Messinger, who attended her. The doctor declared that she had been "dead" for 10 minutes before he arrived at her side.

WOMAN AND DOCTOR SENTENCED TO DIE

Efforts To Secure New Trial For Mrs. Lehouef and Dr. Dreher Are Fruitless.

Franklin, La., Aug. 12.—Mrs. Ada Bonner Lehouef, 37 years old, and the mother of four children, and Dr. Thomas E. Dreher, 35 years old, and the father of three children, today were sentenced to die on the gallows for the murder of James J. Lehouef, husband of the convicted woman.

The woman and the physician received the verdict calmly and both declared they had nothing to say before sentence was pronounced by Judge James D. Simon. The date of the execution will be set by the governor. Dr. Dreher was sentenced first. He stood in the courtroom, wearing a gray summer suit, and was very pale. He kept mopping his face with a handkerchief. "Have you anything to say before I pronounce the sentence," the judge asked him.

"No sir, nothing," he repeated. "Then I sentence you to hang by your neck until you are dead, dead, dead and may God have mercy on your soul," Judge Simon said. Mrs. Lehouef, wearing a black dress and a white hat with a black band, then arose before the judge and the same procedure was followed. The woman had her hair bobbed yesterday and it was her

first public appearance with short tresses. She too, was pale. James Beadle, the third of the trio found guilty last Saturday night, was sentenced to serve the remainder of his life in the state penitentiary. He will be removed to the penitentiary at Baton Rouge next Monday. He did not appear in court this afternoon. The sentencing of Dr. Dreher and his alleged lover, Mrs. Lehouef, followed a long argument and presentation of affidavits.

This Wife Barred Friend Hubby Home

A Kansas City man didn't get home until pretty late one night last week, and a night or so later, about the time his wife was beginning to quiet down a bit and talk about something else, the telephone in the home rang at a late hour. The wife answered the call. "This is the chief of the fire department," said the voice on the wire. "Your husband's store is on fire and I thought perhaps he had better come down." "Yeah," said the wife, "that's a good story. Well, he doesn't go out again tonight. The voice insisted that the store was on fire, but the wife would not be convinced, and refused to call her husband to the phone. Next morning the husband found that the place had been on fire and the damage from fire and water was considerable. "No matter" says the wife. "You couldn't have done any good if you had gone there."

Today's White Lies Help Bad Children

Today's parents, who throw up their hands helplessly, aghast and bewildered by the disregard of law among their sons and daughters, can find a sound explanation for the situation in their own petty dishonesties. This is the accusation hurled at the older generation by Anne Shannon Monroe, the writer, presenting in August Good Housekeeping the results of her study on the development of dishonest traits among children.

Here are some of the people who she says, sow the seeds of example which are bearing fruit in youthful hold-ups, shootings, thefts and other crimes: The mother who tells "white lies" and who has herself reported "not at home" when she wishes to avoid a bothersome visitor or other tiresome obligations.

The mother who "forgets" to return cooking materials, stamps, car fare and other little things borrowed from neighbors and friends.

The father who trims the edges of honesty in his business dealings.

"The boy of today who cuts red tape and goes directly to the tills to steal is only a little farther along the road than his father, or some other equally well-stationed boy's father, who looted a trust fund, or his grandfather who sold fake mining stock, or his great-grandfather who accepted a friend's endorsement of his note when he knew that he was insolvent.

"Money borrows, from a relative or friend, which we think does not have to be returned," the article points out, is one of the surest means of cultivating a dishonest family strain.

"A certain mother comes to my mind," says the writer. "She mortgaged her home to send her daughter to college on the understanding that the daughter would teach school and pay off the debt. But the first year's earnings the daughter went to Europe; with the second she took a post-graduate course; with the third she got married; with the fourth she buried the mother who had worked and worried herself into her grave trying to save the home. And yet today this daughter is one of the leading spirits in the community in the fight against crime wave, apparently wholly unconscious of her own crime against her mother."

(By International News Service) Washington.—Army life is proving popular with most of the regular soldiers if the re-enlistment record is any accurate criterion. This record shows that of 83,019 discharged in the past three years, 48,125 or 58.8 per cent re-enlisted within three months. These figures cover every Army post in the United States and at foreign garrisons.

sified recruiting campaign to bring its enlisted personnel up to the authorized strength of 118,750 in the coming year. The average strength of the army, exclusive of the Philippine Scouts, in the fiscal year just closed was 111,576 and on June 30 it was approximately 113,000. It is hoped that the enlisted strength will reach 121,450 on March 31, 1928, from which point it is expected to recede until it reaches 118,750 on June 30.
