**"GIN MARRIAGE" LAW SLOWS UP WEDDINGS FOR CALIFORNIANS**  
(By International News Service) San Francisco. — Just when they had reconciled themselves to a three-day wait in receiving their marriage licenses, prospective brides and grooms in California learned that they really had to wait four days.

The "gin marriage" law, drawn up to prevent giddy-headed revelers from marrying one day and annulling their marriage the next, provided that "three days" must pass between an application for a marriage license and the issuance of the license itself. This delay, the legislators believed, would enforce cool and calm deliberation.

Now, however, under an interpretation of Attorney General U. S. Webb the three-day period doesn't begin till midnight of the day of the application, and ends at midnight of the third day. Since few applications for licenses or marriages can be performed at that hour of the day the interpretation really places a four-day moratorium in effect.

**ROBINS PAY DOLLARS FOR FAILING TO HIT**  
(By International News Service) New York.—Wilbert Robinson, manager of the Brooklyn Robins has evolved a novel scheme to strengthen his team's batting. Each player who does not make a hit during a game is compelled to donate one dollar to a special fund, and the end of the season the club's leading hitters will take the "pot."

The Robins, like all ball players, love their base hits dearly, but cherish their dollars even more highly. Hence they have had a double incentive to deliver at least one safe blow a game since the new ruling.

The financial strain on the "Runless Robins" or Doless Dodgers" is terrific, however, for they are the weakest hitters in the majors.

If the Dodgers continue to bat at their present low speed, the club's leading hitters should collect about \$150 at the end of the season.

### SOON START WORK ON LANCHA PLANA DAM BIGGEST IN WORLD

(By International News Service) Valley Springs, Cal.—Workmen are assembling and materials are being dumped in vast heaps on the site of the Lancha Plana dam, the largest dam in the world. The massive concrete wall, when completed, will surpass the famous Arrowrock dam near Pocatello, Idaho, which hitherto has held the honor of being the world's biggest water barrier.

The dam will be a part of the water system of Oakland, Berkeley, and other cities on the eastern bank of San Francisco Bay. Arthur Davis, chief engineer of the East Bay municipal utility district, who built the Arrowrock dam and a hundred other dams, is in charge of building the Lancha Plana reservoir.

### Cops Stop Booze And Petting With University Studes

(By International News Service) Iowa City, Iowa.—When the 7,000 or more students who attend the University of Iowa here, return this fall to their classes things in the town aren't going to be what they were. Or, at least, they won't if C. F. Benda, chief of police, is able to change conditions said to have existed in the past.

For one thing, students will do less drinking than in the past, Chief Benda believes, for he has employed a couple of undercover men whose sole duty will be to run down bootleggers and turn up liquor caches. Liquor, it has been charged in a sensational report secured by a state agent at the instance of Governor Hammill, was as easy to obtain here last winter as soda water. All one needed was the price.

Moral conditions also were deplorable, the agent's report stated, but Chief Benda is going to see to that matter, too. For one thing, he already has dug up, dusted off and put into operation the old curfew law. After 11 o'clock, in the future, all persons found loitering about the streets will be picked up as loafers, the chief says. This will include petters and spooners parked in motor cars in the city's parks, the chief says.

The force also will keep an eye on the operation of so-called tearooms in the city.
