NEW YORK MAY PASS 2-CENT TAX ON GAS

Albany, N. Y.—With Governor Al Smith's approval, an effort will be made at the 1927 session of the State legislature to pass a bill levying a tax on gasoline, probably two cents a gallon.

Advocates of the proposal point to the fact that New York and Massachusetts are the only states which do not levy a gas tax.

Representatives of automobile clubs are fighting the proposed tax. Officials of the clubs have said however, they would not oppose such a tax if the state officials would agree to reduce the automobile license fee.

A two cent tax would net the state about \$18,000,000 a year.

Governor Smith urged the last session of the legislature to pass a gas tax measure but the Republican leaders refused, insisting the state did not need additional revenue.

N. Y. City And State Healthier

New York.—This city and New York State have never before been so healthy, according to a report for the first half of the year recently issued by Dr. Matthias Nicoll, Jr., Health Commissioner of the State.

The general death rate and infant mortality were found to be lower than any previous time in the history of the city and State. New low mortality rates from tuberculosis, measles and scarlet fever have also been recorded.

The death rate for June, 1927, was twelve persons per thousand population.

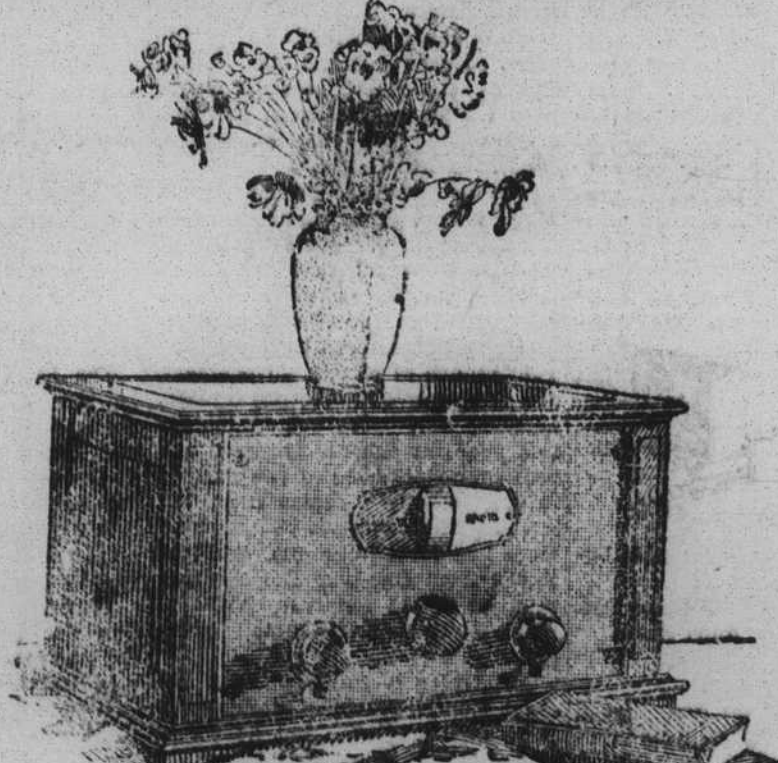

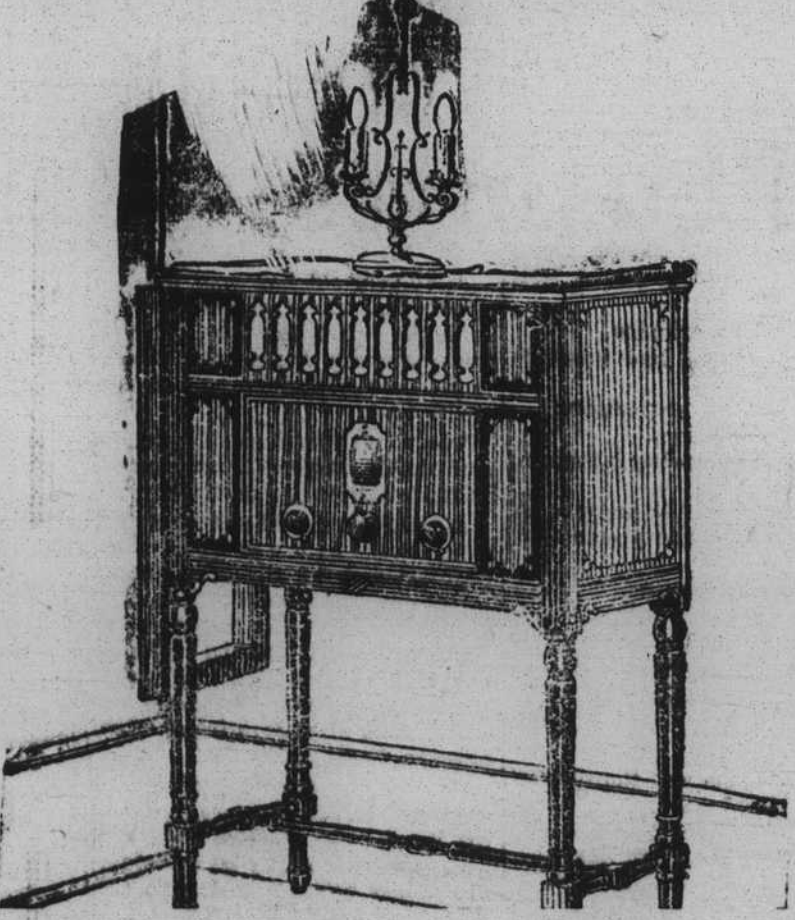
