TOpposes A Gas Plant For Shelby
To Editor of The Star:
In reply to your recent editorial "That Shelby Needs a Gas Plant" I wish to disagree with you by saying that Shelby doesn't need a gas plant, at least not now, possibly so when it reaches a population of 25,000, but not before. So you will stop and think, for a few minutes, why do we need a gas plant, what is it good for, in what way would it be beneficial? A gas plant serves only two purposes, to light and cook with. Do we need it for light? We certainly do not. No one wants a gas light in this day and time. Do we need it to cook with? Not necessarily, as electric cooking is just about as cheap and much more satisfactory. We, the people own the electric plant, and the profit from which helps to hold the taxes down. Do we want to invite a competitor from the outside to come in and share that profit—without benefiting anyone. I should say not. Do you want your streets literally torn up from one end of town to the other, and continuously thereafter putting down gas mains? I don't think there is any need to worry though for I feel quite sure no company would put up a gas plant in Shelby at the present time, and I am positively against insuring a franchise to anyone for that purpose, but if such a franchise was deemed advisable, I should demand a \$10,000 bond that the plant would be finished in twenty-four months.
Promoters have a way of securing a franchise in progressive towns this size, that binds the town for five to ten years, and in the meantime, if the town grows, they see this franchise to some concern at good profit. The chamber of commerce had an inquiry a few months ago—but I do not think they encouraged it at this time.
