Blowing Rock Has New Oddity Claim

It Is Said There Are Times When A Man Could Not Jump Off The Rock.

Blowing Rock.—Speaking of mountains, the view from Blowing Rock changes continually.

The atmospheric sea that incloses mountain and valley melts the solid rocks into a thousand pictures. The wild shapes in the great basin which at one time look near, hard at another time recede and soften dark colors transmuted into the blue of the Blue Ridge.

Sometimes Grandfather Mountain stands solidly out, showing in detail the tapestry of green trees that hangs over its slopes; again it is blue and flat against the sky.

Blowing Rock at times lies above the clouds, with all the world blotted out excepting the Grandfather's summit rising out of the white mists.

Near the city of Blowing Rock, at the beginning of green knobs between which one looks to the lowlands, is a high cliff, the real Blowing Rock, so named because the rocky walls at this point form a flume through which the north-west wind sweeps with such force that whatever is thrown over the rock is hurled back again.

It is said that there are times when a man could not jump over, so tremendous is the force of the wind.

It sometimes rains at Blowing Rock, but there are other times when one stands there on the brink in bright sunshine and sees, it may be, four showers descending on different parts of the country at once.

At Blowing Rock, the Blue Ridge, as so often happens along its course, presents a steep wall towards the foothills, but keeps its elevation at the top, extending back in a wide plateau; hence the country back of Blowing Rock has a general elevation of from three thousand to four thousand feet; that is, the valley bottoms are thus high, constituting another element giving this part of the country its peculiar charm.

RATS IN COAL MINES MISS MINERS' LUNCHES DURING LONG STRIKE

(By International News Service.) Columbus, O.—The strike of coal miners which has tied up the soft coal fields of Ohio, Illinois and other western states since May 31, has brought a new problem to householders in the mine fields of Ohio.

The great rats which infest the coal pits, and grow fat and prosperous dining off the scraps from the miners' lunch pails, and the feed taken into the pits for the mules, have been forced out of the empty pits since the suspension, and are invading the homes and granaries of neighboring farmers.

In the vicinity of St. Clairsville, farmers report that their houses and barns are literally overrun with rodents, which have traveled more than a mile from the big Provident mine.

J. P. Poterfield, St. Clairsville dairyman, reported that a huge rat ate the laces from his shoes, while they were perked under his bed on a recent Saturday night.
