OPPOSES TAX CUT OF \$400,000,000

Washington, Oct. 13.—President Coolidge expects tax reduction to be effected by the next congress, but he believes the \$400,000,000 cut suggested by the United States chamber of commerce to be excessive. He was represented today as feeling that tax reduction should be held in hand with retirement of the public debt, and that the total should be as large as economical administration of the government's affairs would permit. A sharp reminder came again from the White House that any tax reduction would depend on restriction of governmental expenditures, but even with a close curtailment of appropriations, the President believes that any attempt to cut the government's income by \$400,000,000 would result in a deficit. Evidence that President Coolidge is giving close study to reduction of both taxes and the debt was seen in the fact that three announcements dealing with the subject have come from the White House within a week. Having inspected the chamber of commerce proposal for a \$400,000,000 reduction, the President feels that organizations interested in tax reduction could render better service if they worked to prevent unnecessary drains on the treasury. It is known that the President feels that the present conditions are less favorable for tax reduction than in former years, because of the exhaustion of some revenue sources, such as back tax collections and the prospects of large expenditures for the military establishment, the public buildings program, flood relief and the payment of pensions and relief of veterans.
