INCHES OF RAIN

Twice as Much Rain Friday as During the Entire Month of November, Sleet and Cold.

The rain and sleet storm that struck this section Thursday. night and held sway until Sunday brought the heaviest rainfall in recent months. On Friday alone more than twice as much rain fell as during the entire month of November. The rainfall Saturday also surpassed the rainfall of the entire preceding

The total rainfall of the cold. rainy period was 5.49 inches, according to a report made today by Postmaster J. H. Quinn at the Federal building, where a check is kept on the rainfall for the government. Friday, including Thursday night, saw the heaviest rainfall.

The rainfall is checked here every evening at 6 o'clock and by this plan the rain of that night figures in the rainfall of the following flay. The first four days of December saw four times as much rain here as in November with several tubs to spare. The rainfall up until Sunday at 6 in the evening was as follows: December 1—.26 inches; December 2—2.75 inches; December 3—1.80 inches; December 4—.65 inches.
