

Aged Woman Tends Grave Of Sea Victim

Herself Unknown, She Has Visited Unknown's Burial Place For Years.

Audubon, N. J.—A soldier's helmet suspended from a rusty tripod and containing a few plants in bloom, such as sweet-william, mignonette and daisies, in the center of a tiny garden, neglected for many years, and on the ground, near the tripod, a small slab of marble, half covered by weeds and moss, making it difficult to read the simple inscription, "To a Mother's Darling."

The grave is beside the gravel road between the old town of Greenwich—the town of history, mystery and romance—and the wharves on the Delaware Bay, where in fall and winter the oyster fleet unloads its cargo for the warehouses of New York and Philadelphia merchants.

No one can tell who is buried in this lonesome spot. Old fishermen relate the story of the body of a young man being tossed upon the shore many years ago. He was well dressed but could not be identified. They buried him in the little garden and placed the tripod and helmet there.

A few months later townspeople passing by the spot saw the marble

headstone with the inscription, telling the silent story of a mother's love. Since then the flowers in the helmet are renewed once every year. A handsome, stately young woman it was who made the yearly pilgrimage to the grave of one who apparently was dear to her. She came and went and did not speak.

Since the advent of the automobile residents of the town have seen her arrive in a handsome motorcar, driven by a liveried chauffeur. She is now gray and bent, but she still places with loving hands in the soldier's helmet the mignonette and the sweet-william and the daisies and the forget-me-nots.
