Mr. Hoey will probably come to Charlotte late in August or early in Séptember, as the address of the former governor Thursday night Governor Smith on August 22.

Mr. Hoey, known as an ardent dry and a supporter of Governor Smith as well as the state Democratic ticket, was invited to Charlotte after leading Democrats here heard his oration in Shelby Tuesday

While Governor Morrison has been selected to open the drise for the Democratic party here, at least one speaker from out of the state who has a national reputation as an orator will be sought for the program, Mr. Jones said.




