THROWS GASOLINE ON NEGRO HOLDING BURNING MATCH

Beaufort, S. C.—Charged with throwing a bucket of gasoline on a "friend" who held a match, Sherman Washington, negro, was held in jail here to await action of the grand jury.

James Carter, negro victim, of the burning, died in a hospital. His wife, who was burned at the same time, will recover.

According to testimony at the inquest, Washington went to Carter's home with a bucket of gasoline. Finding Carter in bed, Washington is said to have asked him to strike a match, and as he did so, threw the gasoline on him. The house was destroyed by fire.

Washington was captured a few hours later. He is also charged with arson.
