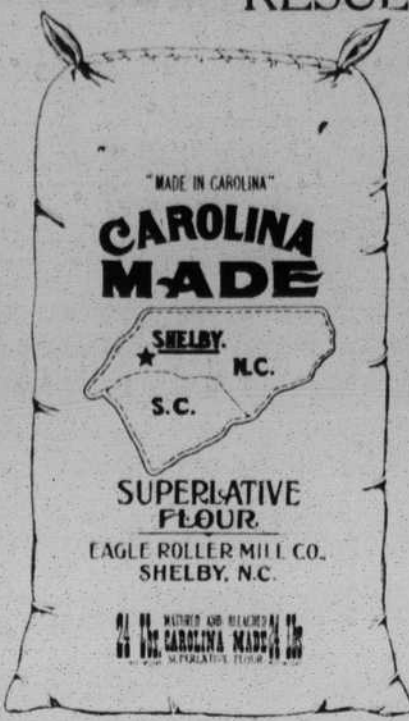

Dallas News weekly Texas crop review says week shows marked deterioration throughout important areas due to excessive heat, dry soils, premature opening, increased weevil and boll worm damage which in many sections has stopped the plant from blooming. August migration of weevils is now underway, 74 counties mostly in famous Black Land belt show serious declines where previously good crop was indicated. South Texas crop prospects have dwindled. Oklahoma crop also shows deterioration.
