A "straight party ticket" merely means that you make one mark for the party of your choice. The idea is not that the adjective "straight" is used in any moral sense.

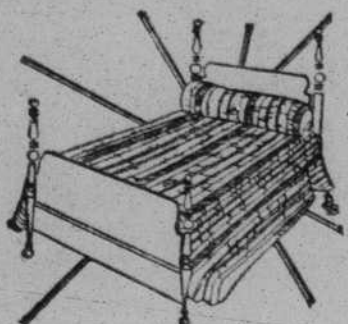
Lady voters leaving the booth need not accept a cigar when proffered. Merely smile, say "I thank you" and leave.

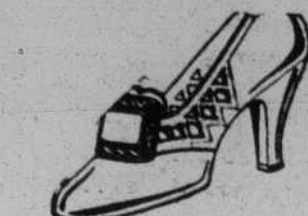
