Extensive reports have been filed by the chief warder of the women's jail at Guanabacoa, suburb town of Havana, asking that provisions be made for immediate building of additional housing facilities for women prisoners.

LEVEL OF SALT LAKE LOWEST SINCE 1903

Salt Lake City.—Great Salt Lake is at the lowest level it has reached since 1903.

The depth reading at the Southern Pacific measuring point hovers around 31 inches, whereas the high level of former years was 83 inches.

A winter of heavy snows followed by heavy spring rains would raise the water level some, but the shrinkage has been so consistent that residents, in alarm, are beginning to wonder if the lake is going to dry up completely.

As the water decreases the salinity increases, being now approximately 26 per cent.

NORTH CHINA GIVING OFFICES TO WOMEN

Peking.—Women in public life are making strides in China.

Dr. Teng Tsui-ying has just been appointed head of the bureau of public health in Peking, being the first woman official in north China. Dr. Teng has practiced medicine for years.

At the same time it was announced that General Chiang Tsopin, chairman of the committee for administration of war areas, had taken under consideration the claims of a number of women candidates for magistracies of local government colleges.

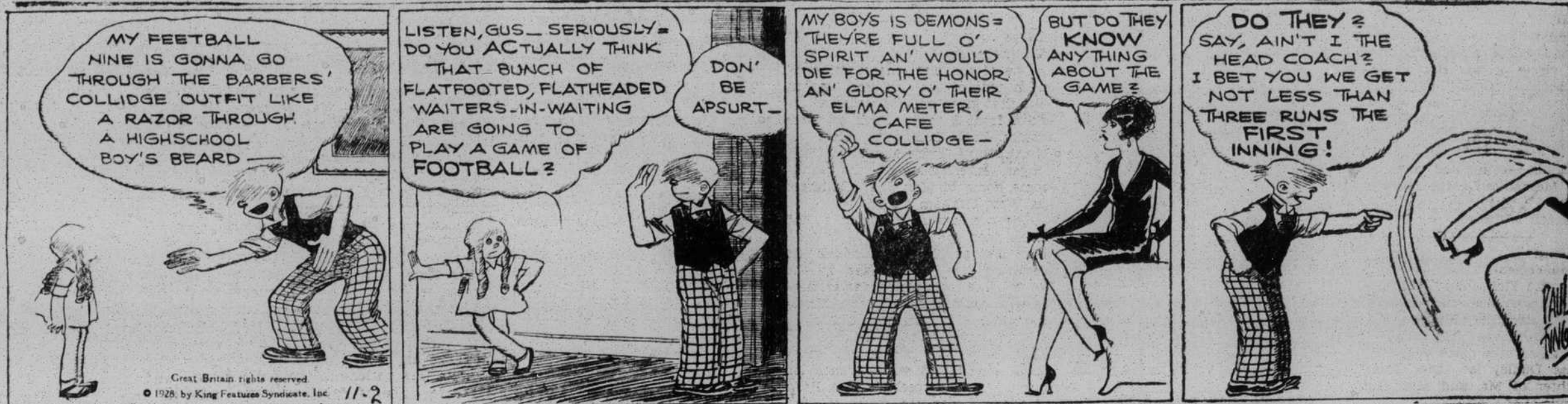
Farmers of Granville county recently purchased 50 head of high grade Guernsey cows.

Republicans Getting Afraid As Election Day Approaches

Washington.—Smith's style of campaign has utterly disrupted the program of the Hoover organization, and instead of clinching the election by October 15, the Republicans, one week ahead of the balloting, are striving desperately to garner 266 electoral votes necessary to success. It is quite obvious here in Washington, the center of Republican activity, that they realize that they are in a much more precarious situation than they anticipated earlier in the fight they would be at the end of October.

Governor Smith's adherence to his original plan to conserve his physical strength and not fire his reserve ammunition until the last fortnight of the campaign is producing the logical result that might have been foreseen. Instead of a worn, dispirited fighter waiting for the final count and removal from the ring in a dazed and helpless condition, the Democratic champion is going stronger, hitting and jabbing his opponent with more fire and fury than at any stage of the great political bout. In the minds and hearts of the contenders could be X-rayed, in all probability it would be disclosed that Smith is more confident than Hoover; that Smith looks forward with eagerness to the last week's campaigning while Hoover dreads it.

Hide Fears. Of course, it is of the utmost importance, or at least they figure it that way, for the Republican high command to disguise their real feeling of apprehension, and none of their literature or statements reflects their nervous if not actually panicky state of mind on the eve of the decisive showdown. But it takes no great gift of penetration to read between the lines or to interpret some of their recent moves.

Smith has demonstrated that he has that thing the masses particularly admire and cheer, the heart of a fighter. Adverse polls and discouraging prognostications by most of the political writers do not seem to have affected the New York governor in the slightest degree. He asks a group of correspondents, "What does anybody know about it?" directs attention to unparalleled outpourings of the people everywhere to see and acclaim him, asks them to be brief, and hastens to his study to work on his next devastating blast.

That is about the way many Republicans are looking at the situation at this stage. Polls and forecasts look good on paper, but after all, some of them privately concede, "What does anybody know about it?" with the element of doubt inherent in the case of more than half the state, and these the states having the greatest number of electoral votes.

Signs of Weakness. Democrats and many detached observers interpret the Hoover charge of socialism directed at Governor Smith as a sign of weakness. When a candidate begins to call his opponent names, the universal disposition is to ascribe it to lack of something to say argumentatively or at least based on reason. In responsible Republican quarters it is now
