WARRING NATIONS TAKE PEACE MOVE

Conference's Offer of Mediation in Row Between Paraguay And Bolivia Accepted.

Washington, Dec. 18.—With its offer of mediation in the Bolivian-Paraguayan controversy accepted by both disputing countries, the way was clear today for the Pan American Conference on arbitration to take affirmative steps to reconcile the two nations.

Dr. Victor Maurtua, of Peru, chairman of the special committee appointed by the conference to suggest conciliation proceeded, conferred immediately today with other members of his committee and plans to call a meeting as soon as Bolivia's acceptance should be received here.

Although no concrete steps have been suggested to remove all danger of war between Bolivia and Paraguay, it is understood that the committee will strive to have both countries cease all warlike activities, urging Paraguay to demobilize and Bolivia to calm its people.

Even partial settlement of the controversy will greatly facilitate the other labors of the conference, which so far has been greatly handicapped by the threat of war hovering over South America. Delegates had so far avoided as far as possible any meeting at which the dispute might have been brought up and given rise to heated debate.

The state department showed great gratification at the announcement of Bolivia's action.

Minister Diez De Medina, of Bolivia, said although he had not yet been notified officially of his government's acceptance that action would be in accordance with the "traditions and invariable policy of Bolivia for peace and conciliatory processes."

He said that while reports from Paraguay showed that country still mobilizing despite the acceptance of the mediation offer, Bolivia "has maintained only her usual garrison on her long border line running parallel to her forts and endeavoring to avoid clashes which might easily be produced by the proximity of the Paraguayan lines."

Although lacking specific instructions on the point, Minister Medina said he supposed that having accepted the conference's good offices Bolivia would active co-operate in the work of the conference's special committee on the Paraguayan-Bolivian tangle.
