District Epworth League To Meet 4th

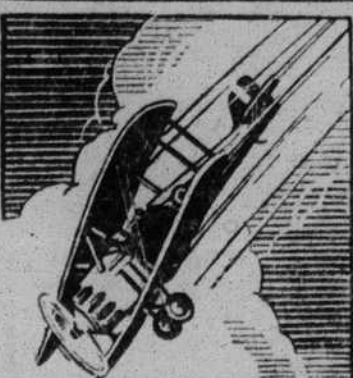

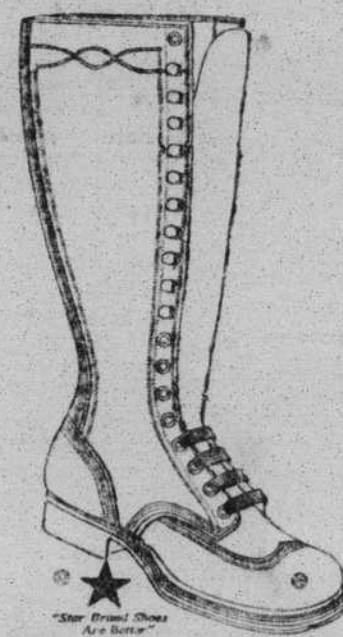
