### New Model Cars For 1929 At N. Y. Automobile Show

(The new model cars for 1929 are now being shown at the New York show and a complete description of the various makes sold in Shelby will appear under this heading, one or two makes each issue until the full line is covered.)

#### Buick Models

A new four-passenger coupe is introduced by Buick at the automobile show as an addition to the silver anniversary line presented last July. The new model is built on a 121-inch chassis and powered with a ninety-one horsepower motor. Exclusive of this model, eighteen cars make up the Buick 1929 line.

On a 116-inch wheelbase, with seventy-four horsepower engine, are a two-door five-passenger sedan, five passenger phaeton, two-passenger business coupe, four-passenger special coupe, and five-passenger four-door sedan. Prices run from \$1,165 to \$1,550.

On a 121-inch chassis, with motor of ninety-one horsepower, are a four-door five-passenger close-coupled sedan, four-passenger sport roadster, two-passenger business coupe, four-passenger special coupe and five-passenger sedan. Prices range from \$1,325 to \$1,550.

On 123-inch wheelbase, with a similar motor, are a seven-passenger touring car, seven-passenger sedan, five-passenger close-coupled sedan, four-passenger de luxe convertible coupe, five-passenger sedan five-passenger coupe and seven-passenger sedan-limousine. The price range is from \$1,525 to \$2,145.

The silver anniversary models embody several changes. With its six-cylinder valve-in-head engine almost one fifth more powerful than before, the entire chassis has been enlarged, vacuum tank has been eliminated and a mechanical fuel pump substituted. Vibration has been reduced through a four-bearing counter-balanced crankshaft.

The front seat in all closed styles is now adjustable.

#### Durants At The Show

Two new six-cylinder cars, both featuring a transmission of four speeds forward, have been added to the Durant line and are introduced at the show. One, the six '66', on a chassis of 112-inch wheelbase, has a Red Seal Continental motor of special design, set in rubber, with a Lanchester vibration damper. It has a bore and stroke of 2 3/4 by 4 1/2 inches, giving 185 cubic inches displacement.

The '66' is said to be the lowest-priced car in the world with four forward speeds. This transmission, it is said, effects a 20 per cent reduction in gasoline and oil consumption and 40 per cent reduction in engine wear. Vibration is also diminished.

Available models include coupe at \$875 and four-door sedan at \$975. De luxe models in each, \$115 extra. Like the '66' the '70' features the third and double-high four forward speed transmission. Although of the same wheelbase—119 inches—and horsepower as the former Durant '75', the '70' is priced \$200 lower.

The '75' is offered in four models four-door sedan at \$1,285, coupe at \$1,195, de luxe models in both at \$135 extra.

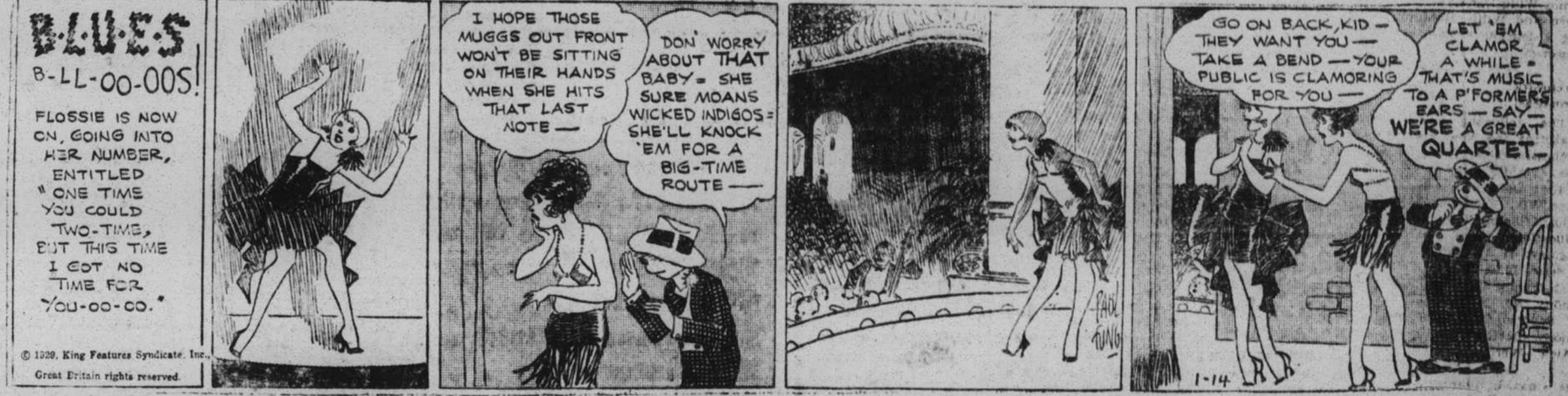
An added feature is a manual control radiator shutter. Like the '60' and the four '40,' also have motors mounted on rubber and chromium plating on exterior bright parts. The 1929 '60' features a larger and more powerful engine, a bore of 2 3/4 inches and stroke of 4 1/2 inches, with increased piston displacement of 185 cubic inches.

Nine styles, standard and de luxe are offered. The four '40,' a continuation of the four introduced last year and before that known as the Star, has a wheelbase of 107 inches. It comes in seven models.

## Postal Receipts Gain Here Is Shown By Figures Announced

Postoffice Must Hold Gain To Remain in First Class Ranking, Said.

The progress of Shelby and the surrounding territory was substantial and continuous throughout the year 1928 is fully and clearly demonstrated by the appended tabulation of the receipts of the Shelby post office for the two years 1927 and 1928. It will be noted that there was an increase each month in the year, except September. For some unexplained reason, there was a loss of \$403.48, or 13 per cent under that of the previous year. Many other leading offices throughout the country fell back during that month. The loss for September had to be made up thus reducing the gain for the entire year of 8.2 per cent. The total receipts for the year 1928 were \$40,206.07, which means an excess of \$206.07 above the minimum requirement for a first class post office. So it appears that Shelby, after July 1, will have a first class office. To retain that position, we will need to hold our receipts above the minimum limit. Growing as Shelby is, we can see no reason why it should not permanently retain its classification, unless some disaster strikes us.
