# GARDNER CHANGES FORMER STAND ON HIGHER GAS TAX

Expenditure Should Be By Counties Insead Of State, Governor Says.

Raleigh.—In a general discussion. oncerning the road bill being frawn by a senate committee to inrease the tax on gasoline one cent a gallon, Governor O. Max Gardner said his views had changed lightly since his inaugural address.

His position is that expenditure of the extra cent should be done by the counties instead of by the state highway department as he first recommended and that the highway department should have indirect supervision of the expenditures. He would have the counties' projects first approved by the department before making any expen-

Some county officials wish to expend this extra cent, in part, for other than road purposes he said, reducing taxes on other

Governor Gardner is absolutely opposed to this. He favors expending all the gasoline tax on roads. where he thinks it should go, and in this way relieve the counties of spending money collected on other things for this purpose.
