**Scalloped eggs**—One dozen hard boiled eggs, 2 cups bread or cracker crumbs, 4 tablespoons of flour, 4 tablespoons of butter, 2 cups sweet milk, 1 teaspoon salt. Make sauce of the flour, butter, salt and milk. Arrange eggs and crumbs in layers and cover with sauce. Bake in moderate oven until slightly brown.

**Puff omelet**—Three eggs, 3 tablespoons cream or milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons sugar, 1 teaspoon baking powder. Beat egg yolks slightly and mix in with ingredients. Fold in stiffly beaten whites and bake in moderate oven.

R. V. Colston of New York was evicted by his landlord because he played his piano until 3 a. m.

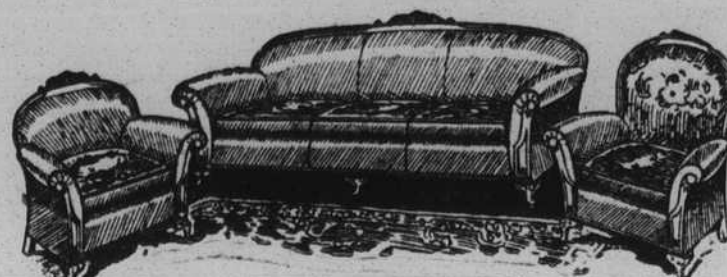

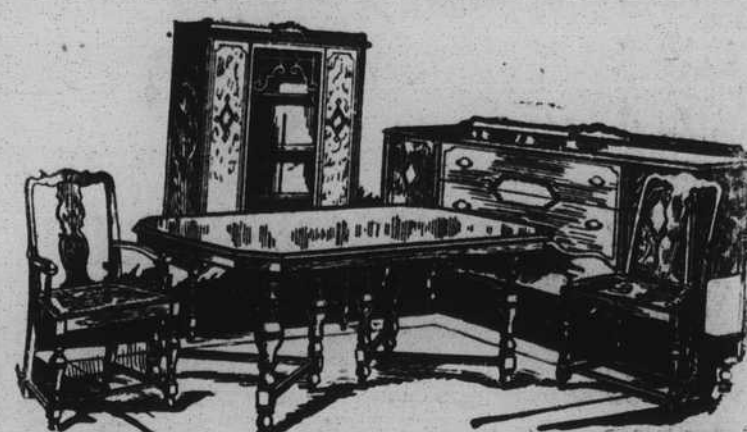

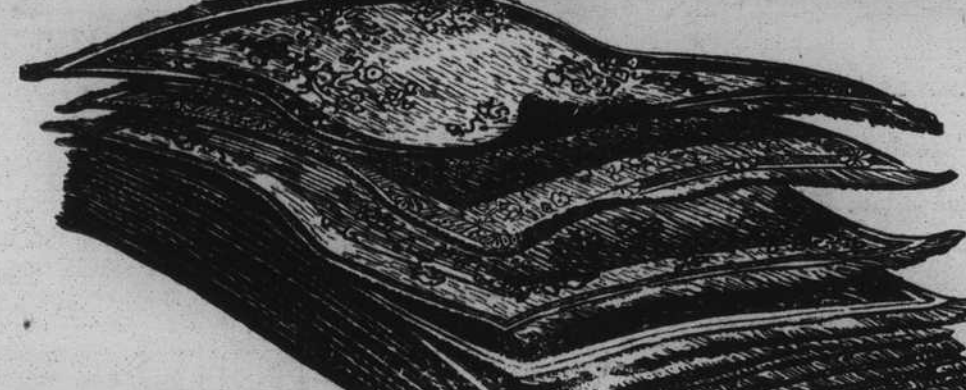
