ANALYSIS SHOWS ONE **COW TO BE WORTH 12**

Analysis of more than 100,000 yearly individual records from cows on test in dairy herd improvement associations indicate that, on the average, cows that produce 100 pounds of butterfat a year returned \$14 each over cost of food; those that produced 200 pounds, \$54 over cost of feed; 300 pounds, \$96; 400 pounds, \$138; and 500-pound cows returned \$178 over cost of feed. Thus the man milking a 500-pound producer would have more return than if he milked a dozen 100pound cows, and this would take no account of the added labor of milking and caring for the larger herd or of the much greater expense of providing stable room for a herd instead of a single animal. The figures from returns are based on farm prices from all parts of the country including whole-milk districts.
