Spot sales 7,000. Middling 1110 against 1098 yesterday. Over 3 in. rain at Meridian, still raining; 2.46 at Vicksburg. Forecast, Eastern belt occasional rains. Western belt showers. Good business in Worth street yesterday. Retail stores report large trade and in some centers buying is as broad as at Christmas. There is an increasing disposition to transfer long May to July or new October and December probably due to the possibility of large deliveries on May. New speculative buying is also beginning to veer to the next crop months all of which accounts for
