

Be Treated.

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There are millions of men and women who act in a foolish and langerous manner when they deelop a headache. Instead of recognizing pain as a signal of somehing wrong inside, they are too apt to blame it on outside cause and reat it as a disease itself. Headache is the most common of ymptoms. It is present in practic-0 ally every sickness-be that sickness mild or serious. In the majority of ailments it is the first signal that pops up. And yet, though it is Nature's warning that something is wrong-though it counsels the individual to stop, look and listenhundreds of thousands of individuals do not heed the warning. Instead they drop into the first drug ore and ask for something that will stop the headache. And they isually get it, and very soon the neadache disappears. But in adlition to the cause of the headche, the body is frequently conronting with the further task of ombating a poisonous headache

Headaches are of many varieties und types. They differ in regard to he part of the head involved. They differ in the character of the pain whether sharp or dull, uffered. onstant or in paroxysms. They differ in their immediate auses-some are brought on by bright lights, some by harsh noises, ome by indigestion, and many others by equally vary causes. There are morning, noon and night headaches, and each type of headache may have its special cause and significance. When the patient goes to the doctor complaining of a headache, the doctor looks upon this complaint as indicative of comething else that is wrong. He searches for the cause, and, finding the probable one or ones, he proceeds to treat both cause and symptom. No conscientious physician would treat a headache without first trying to ascertain its

Practically all infectious and conagious diseases, and especially those associated with high fever, set in with a headache, and may retain this symptom throughout the entire course of the disease. Anemia, in its various forms, often is the cause of headaches. Nephritis, or inflammation of the kidneys, produces like effects. Hysteria s one of the most common causes. Infection in the head cavities may produce pain in the head. Defecevesight, uncorrected by glasses, or incorrectly treated, will give pain above the cycbrows. Infected teeth may result in headache, and constipation, disorders of the digestion and uterine disease will produce it. This lists but the principal causes.

A headache may merely proclaim a temporary ailment that will soon cure itself. Frequent headaches, severe headaches, headaches of an uncommon character require medical treatment and the sufferer O should consult his physician. In the case of the ordinary headache -that is, the occasional mild attack-it is often possible for the sufferer to trace the source of his ailment, and occasionally, having traced the source, to remove it by simple, commonsense methods, Thus, if the headache is due to a stuffy atmosphere, a walk in the open air will do much to relieve it. Regular exercise-in the open air, 0 if possible-will often put an end to habitual headache. If you can get a morning exercise drill on your radio, take it regularly. Or, if one's head aches because of long application to reading and writing in poor or improper light, reclining for a while in a dimly-lit or darkened room will help. In most cases a rest is indicated for the headache. A tepid bath. taken for ten or fifteen minutes, will help. The application of a cold pack to the head, or to the back, of the neck if often very helpful. The headache that is due to too much smoking, too much tea or coffee or other overindulgence, violent exercise, lack of sleep and the like indicates its own treatment. Constipation is a very common cause of headaches, and a careful observation of the rules of diet and exercise, with regular attention to the bowels, will usually remove the symptom. Simple medical treatment for an upset or overloaded stomach or intestinal tract cures many headaches. It is the most important of all, nowever, always to understand that a headache is only a signal of disease somewhere in the body.
