

**Storekeeper Loads
A Thief With Shot**

Gaffney, S. C.—Officers here are conducting a quiet search for a man believed to have been peppered with birdshot early Sunday morning as he attempted to batter his way into the store of Hammett Brothers on Cherokee avenue with an axe.

The store was robbed a few weeks ago. Having a "hunch" Saturday that it was time for a repetition of the visit by the marauder, Davis Hammett, one of the brothers, decided to spend the night in the store. His precaution proved accurate.

About 3 a. m. a man approached the building and after an unsuccessful effort to force the doorlock, departed. In a few minutes he returned with an axe. As he began an assault on the door, Mr. Hammett leveled his gun and fired. The robber fled, but Mr. Hammett is confident none of the shot took effect in his body.

George Karpenecker, proprietor of the Royal Restaurant on Lenoire street here, reported to officers that his establishment was robbed of about \$40 in cash, two boxes of cigars and some cigarettes early Monday morning.

Judge Keister spoke sternly: "Go home—and take your baby with you."


