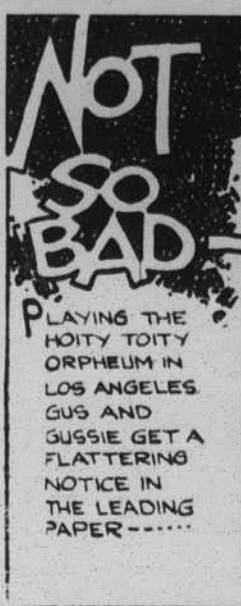

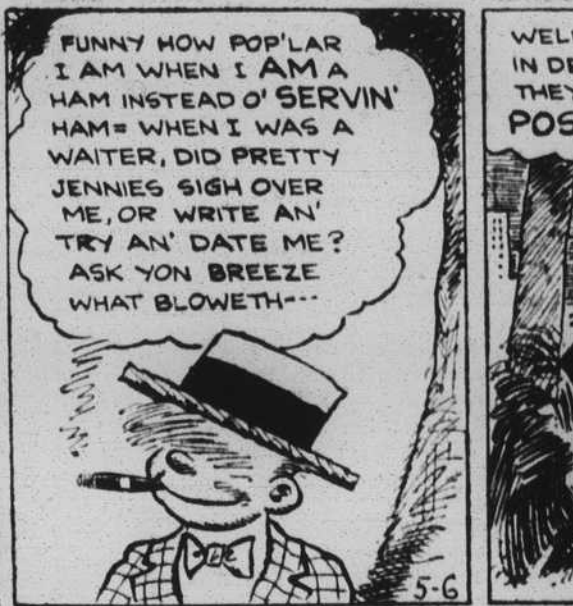

Russian Scientist Works With Death

London—Scientists outside Russia and France have not heard much of the Russian anatomist Andreiev for some time, but the latest news from Moscow tells of many unannounced experiments that he and a colleague named Kuliboko have been carrying out with the object of finding the true meaning of death. Is it something that happens suddenly or is it a gradual process? They think it is gradual, so gradual that one of them, Dr. Kuliboko, claims to have resuscitated the heart of a man after he had been dead for several days.

Professor Andreiev, in a recent Moscow lecture, showed the live beating heart of a dog which had been "dead" for many hours. He stated his belief that real death only occurs after life has departed from the cells of the nerve system, and that life can be revived unless that system is completely disintegrated. He further announced his belief that life could be resuscitated as long as the circulation of the blood could be restored.

Professor Andreiev's life has been as weird as his experiments. Before the war he was a well known worker in the laboratory of St. Petersburg university, with a special knowledge of the nervous system. Then came the revolution, and Russia had no further need for people of his class. What happened to him about that time he has never told, even to his most intimate friends. At any rate, he was condemned to death. He was taken to Moscow to be executed, but he managed to escape. Then began a tramp ever southwards, towards the shores of the Black Sea. He managed to maintain himself for a year in Odessa as a shoemaker.

He came to London destitute, but found his way to the house of a well known anatomist who knew his work and provided him with the means of continuing it. The result was a brilliant description of some of the minute nerves of the heart, which he sent to the International Anatomical congress.

Now he seems to have been reinstated in his own country.

York Ignorant Of Chautauqua There

York, S. C.—Although fifty odd citizens of this town almost a year ago signed a contract with the Associated Chautauquas, pledging the chautauqua people \$1,250 in order to insure a five-day engagement of the chautauqua, nobody seems to know anything about it; no organization of the guarantors has been perfected; no attempt has been made to sell tickets or to secure a lot on which to pitch the chautauqua tent.

It is understood that the chautauqua company is to open its engagement here May 16. Recently a quantity of advertising matter for the chautauqua was shipped to the superintendent of the graded school. Why it should be shipped to him the superintendent does not know.

The advertising matter was shipped collect and the school superintendent paid the express charges. The packages remain in the graded school building unopened.

What Of Lindbergh Now?

Washington Daily News. When young Charles Augustus Lindbergh flew over the sea to France and came back to receive the adoration of his homeland, ours was among the voices lifted to chant his praise. Publicly we shouted to the skies. But privately we shook our old gray head. For we have lived long and we have seen a lot. And we know what happens to heroes. We know that when people release all emotional restraint and let themselves go in one direction, sooner or later those same people are pretty certain to swing far in the other direction. We are old enough to remember Admiral Dewey.

"So we registered a vow. The very night the news came that the boy had come down safely on the edge of Paris we said, very privately, that whatever the lad might turn out to be in later weeks or months or years we would keep our mind fixed on that moment of his supreme accomplishment. He had given us something then that we would never allow ourselves to lose. If the feet that guided the rudder of the Spirit of St. Louis proved later to be feet of clay we would ignore that fact in our innermost soul and keep the warm thrill reposing there by grace of his pure heroism.

We remain faithful to our vow. But we cannot blind our eyes to what is beginning to happen. And we cannot close our ears. The phone has been ringing fairly constantly since yesterday afternoon and our readers want to know whether or not we intend to tell that young smart aleck where he gets off. The inquiry relates to a thing Lindbergh did yesterday afternoon at Boiling Springs. It seems he expressed his steadily growing disdain for the crowds that wait to worship him, by manipulating his machine to throw mud. He splashed reporters, photographers and women tourists impartially, so it is told, in his unbridled expression of impatience.

Well, we'd like to tell the boy where he gets off, but we doubt that it would serve any good purpose. All we could tell him is that he is hastening the day when America's emotional excess will be the reverse of that which met him on his return from his great triumphs. And we don't feel in the least inclined to scold. We would like rather to take him alone for a quiet half hour and relate a little of the human history that we have learned in the hope that it might help to guide his course and prepare him for the inevitable day when his popularity will have turned to unpopularity. We would like to preach a little and explain that one must resign one's self to life as it is. People who have warts on their noses learn to bear their crosses bravely and make the best of things. People who become popular heroes should do the same thing.

And Lindbergh should know that while he can't escape being a hero, the other millions of us cannot escape being hero-worshippers.

We'd like very much to get this idea over to Lindbergh, but probably we never will have the chance.

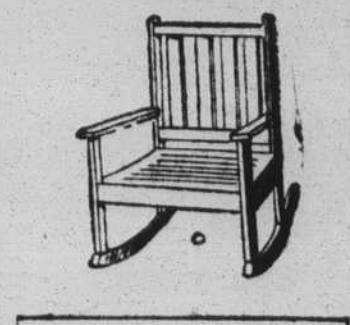
