Wore Two Roses On Mother's Day, Has Strange Story

Raleigh News & Observer. Tears welled in the eyes of the man with two roses. A few paused to ask him why there were two—a red rose and a white rose. Many more observed them and wondered. All Raleigh Sunday was wearing a rose—a red one in honor of the mother who was living, a white one in memory of the mother that was dead. The man with two roses told his story, unshamed of the tears. Mother's Day to him was vastly significant. In a ranch house in Texas 45 years ago the man's story had its beginning. Just an hour after he was born, and ever since he was old enough to observe the custom of wearing a rose on Mother's Day he has worn two—a white one for the mother he never knew. A red one for the "mother" who saved his life at grave danger of her own. "An hour after I was born," he related, "a gasoline stove exploded, igniting the frame ranch house. My real mother was killed—the mother I know rescued me, despite horrible injury to herself. From a wheel chair she cared for me—has been 'mother'." "So I wear two roses—the white one for the mother I never knew. The red one for the 'mother' who has meant everything to me. Oh, yes I'll tell you my name, but what does it matter? Just call me the man with two roses," said the man, unshamed of his tears. "I've told you my story because I think there may be others who should wear two."
