POINCARÉ FACING WAR DEBT FIGHTS
French Cabinet In Deep Water Chiefly Over Debt Accord With U. S. A.
Paris.—Premier Raymond Poincaré's cabinet was in extremely rough water tonight as a result of several political developments, but principally because of controversy over the reservations to ratification of the war debt accord with the United States.
The chamber of deputies finance commission voted 17 to 16 to include the reservation making France's war debt payments dependent on Germany's reparations payments in the accord. As a result Deputy Pietri, chairman of the commission, resigned. He contended that the reservation should follow the accord, but should not be included in the measure by which the chamber is expected to authorize the government to decree ratification of British and American accords.
Deputy Palmade, a radical Socialist, was elected to succeed Pietri, but the commission's action made more definite the cleavage between the chamber and the cabinet. The commission's decision was absolutely contrary to the government's views.
The second danger which the cabinet is facing grew out of a trivial incident, but revealed the opposition of the radicals in their determination to overthrow Poincaré's government. The incident involved whether Police Chief Chiappe of Paris was slapped by a former service man during the recent anti-ratification demonstrations at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.
"The chamber of deputies—with a large number of members talking angrily against the cabinet—apparently is seeking to overthrow the government on a secondary domestic issue to avoid international reaction to defeat of the premier on a question like the debt accords ratification.
It appears that the chamber has found in the Chiappe incident sufficient grounds for overthrowing Poincaré. The left radical leader, Deputy Dorman, leader of a group of ex-service men in the chamber, declared publicly that Chiappe was slapped, but both the police chief and Minister of Interior Andre Tardieu denied it. Dorman said he will question the government on Tardieu's denial and the chamber must decide the date of interpellation Friday. The test for the cabinet will come on that date.
The entire affair depends on whether Tardieu takes the objection of Dorman seriously, for 20 radicals are ready to vote against the government, as are most of the ex-service men.
The Socialists and radical Socialists meanwhile will hold further sessions to determine fully their position on ratification of the debt accords. The radical Socialists have voted to favor ratification with reservations, but the Socialists are unable to agree on whether to accept ratification even with reservations. They have decided, however, definitely to oppose the ratification motion as now favored by the government.
